

# "OLD HOME WEEK" HORSE RACES BRING GLASSY FIELDS TOGETHER

## Every Race Split Up—Finishes Were Close And Exciting—Next Day's Races Tomorrow.

The weather was ideal for the first day's racing of Old Home Week and the races drew an attendance of about 2,500 people. The racing was splendid in every way, every class was split up and the many surprises made it very exciting for the spectators who pronounced it about the snappiest racing they had seen for years. There were a large number of starters in every event and this made considerable scoring, the difficulty being to get them away on even terms. Starter Thompson, however, handled his fields very capably, the only criticism that could be made of the meet being the long time between the events due to some of the horsemen taking too much time in getting out.

### 2.15 Trot and Pace—Purse \$500.00

This was the first event and attracted several starters, all horses with reputations for speed and many of them being excellent winners in previous years over some of the big American tracks. It turned out to be a very exciting race with close finishes in almost every heat.

**First Heat.** Longset drew the pole and went away flying and retained it throughout, the fight being principally for second, third and fourth positions. Dan Patch beat the beaten out on the home stretch by Jean Bingen, T. J. Develin and Red Line in a driving finish, Longset having a good length to spare, the others being well bunched. Time 2:16 1/4.

**Second Heat.** It looked as though Longset would be an easy winner from his performance in the first heat, but in this heat the pacers got pretty well thawed out and some great springing took place for positions. Longset led all the way until turning into the home stretch, when Red Line came up with a great burst of speed. T. J. Develin also passing Longset and finishing very close on Red Line's pad. Longset third, Dan Patch fourth and Jean Bingen fifth. This was a corking heat, some great driving for positions was done. Time 2:16 1/4.

**Third Heat.** Jean Bingen got away flying in this heat being fully a length to the good in the get-away. This gave her the pole before the first turn was reached and she held this right to the finish, although closely pressed by Red Line who put up a wonderful burst of speed on the home stretch, finishing on Jean's neck. Longset was again third having made a wonderful bid for position all the way around until the last hundred yards. T. J. Develin 4th, having gone a very creditable mile, and Dan Patch fifth. Time 2:15 3/4.

**Fourth Heat.** This was a repetition of the thing on Red Line coming up with a burst at the finish and almost winning from Jean Bingen, Longset also going an excellent heat. Time 2:15 3/4.

**Fifth Heat.** Only three heat winners came out on the fifth heat and it was again a contest principally between Jean Bingen and Red Line with Longset
