NEW AUSTRALIAN WARGRAFT "CANGERRA" CHRISTENED BY PRINCESS MARY
 LONDON, June 2—Princess Mary Christened the "Cangerra" which was launched on the Clyde in the presence of a large gathering amidst considerable enthusiasm. The Cangerra, named after Australia's new capital, is the second battle cruiser built on the Clyde for Australia in a few months. The first cruiser is now being fitted out.

TO MOTHERS AND FATHERS.
 Sir—The Patriot professes to be very anxious about the mothers in this province, and their children. It is very easy about the conditions recently revealed in which young men are implicated in thieving and drunkenness to the heart-break of their mothers and the disgrace of the whole community. How are these conditions to be improved? The Patriot wants the mothers of this province to vote for a continuance of the law, which was in force when the recent immoral and disgraceful situation was developed. On the other hand the Leader of the Government has declared that "I will try this for myself and for my followers in the Government and in the Legislature that not only so far as Temperance sentiment is concerned, but in every matter affecting the interests of the people, morally or otherwise, we will not take second place to any body or organization in the Province."
 Again, the Premier said, in his speech at the opening of the campaign: "I want to say also, that we are in earnest about this matter. It is not a matter of increased revenue. It is not a matter of 'free rum'. It is not a matter of placing taverns at every corner. It is a matter of an honest attempt to bring about better moral conditions and a greater respect for law and honor in this Province. That is our incentive. That is the motive with which we have taken up this subject. I say emphatically that we stand in this matter for the interest of the people, and we are going to fight this thing to the finish."
 When the mothers of Prince Edward Island contrast these words of truth and soberness with the prate of the Patriot about "legal rum" and "the whiskey fiend" they will—those of them who are wise and are not more anxious for the success of the Liberal Party than they are for the youths of the Province—vote for the application of the policy described and set forth by Premier Stewart.
 Premier Stewart is, himself, the father of a family; and he can sympathize with those fathers and mothers whose boys have gone wrong in the loose conditions which have lately prevailed. He has, in the past, been true to his word.  DON'T OVERLOOK FRONT WHEELS

TEMPERANCE AND BOGEYS

That Car Of Yours

 Henry Ford Tells What Automobile Owners and Drivers on How to Get the Most Out of Their Cars at the Least Expense.

WHEN VACUUM TANKS FAIL.

Vacuum tanks, among the most efficient units of the modern automobile, rarely give trouble. When they do, the cause usually is found to be dirt collected at the point of gasoline outflow. It can be removed fairly easily, but the motorist should be careful not to go beyond simple cleaning. Otherwise, the delicate mechanism may be upset. Real vacuum tank repairs usually are the province of the skilled mechanic.

COMMUTATOR COLOR A STORY.

The condition of the commutator usually can be determined by its color. If the shade is dark brown or bluish, the unit can with fair accuracy be assumed to be in good condition. Many, however, mistake the bright copper color as indicative of this fact. This is wrong. This color means abrasion and rapid wear, in most cases. The cause will be found to be an excessively heavy spring pressure or a collection of dust and dirt.

MAKING HOME-MADE MAGNET.

Nuts and screws and other small parts that drop down into the drip pan during the process of repairing the car can be retrieved easily by a simply made magnet. All that is needed to make such a retriever is a file and an electric light cord. Wrap the latter around the file and turn on the current for a few minutes. This hint may come in handy when the motorist has dropped a nut that is absolutely essential to the repair job into an inaccessible part of the car.

MAKES REMEMBERING EASY.

To learn out the carburetor mixture, turn the needle valve clockwise. To enrich it, the auxiliary air valve should be turned similarly. It occasionally happens that the motorist forgets this process. This is the time of the year to cut down the flow of gasoline to the carburetor. Warm weather calls for a leaner mixture.

REPAIR TOP LEAKS AT ONCE.

Leaks in the top of the open or closed car deserve immediate repair. If the car owner procrastinates long in such a case, the opening may get beyond repair, thus necessitating very considerable expense. In the closed car instance, the fabric and top superstructure rot quickly under such circumstances. It is well to keep the top occasionally dressed with one of the fine substances prepared for this purpose. They should be selected with real care, however, for one may use a worthless product with more harm than good.

WATCH OUT FOR THE WIPER.

In washing the car, especial care should be taken not to move the arm of the electric windshield wiper by hand. This arm is set in a fixed position and if moved manually, will be thrown entirely out of line in such a way that it will do no good when next it rains. The switch always is handy and pro-
