Frocks that are spotted by water or any substance other than grease should be immediately rubbed with a clean handkerchief or cloth to prevent a ring forming. Taffeta usually responds beautifully to this treatment, thus saving a cleaner's bill. Grease spots can often be removed by placing a blotter over the material and ironing the blotter with an iron warm enough to melt the grease. In this way, the blotter absorbs the grease. Should a ring remain, try using a little chloroform or some cleaner

that is guaranteed not to spot. Pour cleaner on clean cloth and rub over material, rubbing away from the spot, until material is entirely dry.

Creamed Mushrooms

1 lb. mushrooms, 3 table-spoons butter, 3 egg yolks, 1 cup thin cream, 3 table-spoons flour, salt, cayenne to taste. Peel mushrooms, remove stems and cut in pieces. Make 1/4 cup of stock from the stems and peelings. Put caps in DOUBLE BOILER with the cream and cook until tender. Drain and use this cream to make a sauce, with the flour and butter cooked together. To sauce add the beaten egg yolks, mushrooms and mushroom stock and season. Serve on toast points.

Latest Inventions And Discoveries

The curious influence of the dominant side of the body was lately shown in science by evidence that speakers before a large audience have a tendency to address the right-hand side of the assembly, or the opposite side if the speaker happens to be left handed. A later writer notes that the same unconscious tendency may be seen in the school-room, the teacher's attention being concentrated on the pupils at one side. And now in Electrical Merchandising is given the experience of a retailer who has recently discovered that a similar anomaly in his trade must have existed for ten years, and has proven that the right-hand side of his store is worth to him four times as much as the other side. Of two pay telephones installed, the one on the right side of the store took in four times as many nickels as the one on the left. Various experiments gave like results, certain goods moved from the left side to the right bringing more sales in one day than the previous fortnight, while the sale of flashlights shifted from the right of the store to the left dropped 95 per cent.

A case of chronic eczema, with itching so severe as to prevent sleep, has been traced by two French physicians to wheat flour, and they find reason for believing that such cases are commoner than has been supposed. In this case efforts to get relief had included curtailing every article of diet except bread. Improvement followed withdrawal of bread, the diet otherwise normal, and the patient—a woman of 63—was made insensitive to further irritation by means of wheat flour and serum.

A new plastic material for book covers and like purposes is a mixture of rubber with such waste as sawdust, leather buffings, ground shavings, and shoddy. The material can be dyed any color. It has advantages over leather in greater cheapness and durability, and it is adapted for producing a much wider range of effects.

Crepesoled footwear, already tried in America and England, is reported as a promising novelty in South Africa. The crepe rubber sometimes referred to as "plantation soles"—is the pure product, yellowish in color, and of a close-knit gristly texture, and it said to be satisfactorily prepared only on the plantations. Commerce Reports states that, as supplied for soles, crepe rubber ordinarily comes in sheets of about 13 by 36 inches. In several thicknesses ranging from one-sixteenth to three-eighths of an inch. The chief advantage of the material is its excellent wearing quality, and in this respect it is declared to be superior to vulcanized rubber. Various other advantages are claimed. It is lighter and less expensive than other kinds of rubber. It grips the ground, it can be put on readily, and shoes with crepe rubber soles are easy on the feet and have no tendency to heat. It is not entirely without drawbacks, however. Under severe conditions, it has a tendency to "spew" or spread, thin soles on light tennis shoes sometimes become loose at the toes, very thin soles tear, and no satisfactory method of sticking crepe rubber to leather has been found.

The reputed earthquake-warning efficiency of pheasants, which are known to be peculiarly sensitive to feeble tremors, has been tested by Prof. Omori, Japanese seismologist. In three years of observation of the birds in a nearby park, he noticed 22 croakings of the pheasants, and only one earthquake occurred without such sign of disturbance. On four occasions the birds crowded when the tremor was too slight to be detected by the human observer, though the instruments recorded it. On seven occasions they crowded before the man felt the movement, on five at the same time that he perceived it, and one five a little afterward. Thus it appears that half of the earth tremors were signalled by the pheasants before they were apparent to the trained observer.

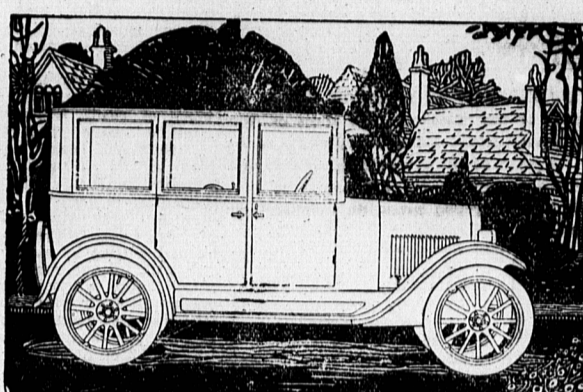
The flamingos of Andros Island, in the Bahamas, are reported to number only about 1200, and their protection is being sought to prevent the total disappearance of a picturesque type of animal life. They vanished many years ago from Florida, where they were once numerous. The flesh of the young is tender and fine-flavored, and the birds are easy game to an army of overzealous sportsmen. A flamingo colony has been pronounced by one naturalist the most wonderful thing in the bird world.

Malleable iron hammers were cast, hardened and finished, and were supplied to carpenter and machine shops, and other places likely to give hard usage. All have been reported in good condition after a test of three months.

Going to live on a farm brought no relief, one eye becoming totally blind and the other much impaired. At a hearing of the Colorado Industrial Commission, it was demonstrated that the injury was a result of repeated posture to the carbon monoxide of the automobile-engine exhaust.
