HOW TO ATTRACT MEN TO TEACHING Canada, according to a statement made in the annual report of the Department of Education, tabled in the Legislature this afternoon by Hon. R. S. Thornton, Minister of Education, in Manitoba during the last year the teacher supply was inadequate, the report says, and to meet the situation it was necessary to issue 400 permits to untrained persons to teach in the rural districts, where the untrained represent more than 25 per cent of the total teaching force. An endeavor to attract more men into the profession is being made, it being the contention of the department that the male teachers must be enabled to marry and settle down in this community.
