Synopsis of Canadian North-West Homestead Regulations.
 ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-west Provinces, excepting 6 and 20, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.
 Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent receive authority for some one to make entry for him.
 The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:
 (1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
 (2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.
 (3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.
 Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

RUSSIA'S EASTERN ARMY.
 After all her losses by battle and disease and the large number of men returned home since the war Russia has still some 300,000 men in Manchuria and in garrison at Vladivostok. A large portion of this force will remain in the east until the Japanese and Russian officials shall complete the details of the evacuation as agreed upon. This will yet occupy the best part of a year, and not till then will the war account be closed.
 In the meantime, despite the utmost precautions, some news of the strikes, disturbances and massacres in Russia has reached the rank and file of Gen. Linevitch's forces, and they have become disorderly and at times mutinous. Formidable mutinies have occurred in the garrisons at Vladivostok and Harbin, which report says have been suppressed with bloody slaughter. But the spirit of unquiet and discontent prevails, and while the army in northern European Russia has remained outwardly loyal there are evidences of great distrust in Government circles as to the troops in the east as well as in southern Russia.
 News travels slowly in Russia, especially under the present rigid censorship and it is not by any means likely that the army in Manchuria is at all fully informed as to the extent of the trouble at home. But the men in Manchuria are in the very nature of things fully aware of the disasters which were suffered during the war. The long succession of defeats and retreats must have had a very demoralizing effect upon the troops and led them to distrust their commanders and the Government. Should the spirit of insubordination become general in the Manchurian army it would be utterly impossible for the Government to send an adequate force from Moscow to suppress it.
 We can readily understand also that if the Manchurian force were brought home, the men with their vivid impressions of the mismanagement and suffering caused by the war might powerfully influence the minds of the people at home in the direction of further discontent. The temporary quiet in Russia must not be mistaken for a permanent settlement. Russia's troubles are by no means over, and the army in the East constitutes an important factor in the great problem yet to be solved.

Winnipeg has a population one fifth of whom are of foreign birth, and twenty different languages are spoken in its streets. Quite a polyglot city.
 While we hear much in those days of the great efficiency of the turbine steam engine the fact remains that it has an increasingly formidable competitor in the gas engine. Today the large gas engines of the best type are claimed to yield one fifth of the total heat value of their fuel, which is an efficiency about twice as great as the best steam turbine. New methods of producing gas for power purposes have brought this about. There is evidently a great future before the gas engine.
 By the treaty recently signed between Japan and China the latter agrees to open sixteen ports in Manchuria to the trade of the world. This is a notable concession to the open door policy and will be of great advantage to the commercial nations. Russia, although in close touch with the Chinese boundary for thousands of miles and disposed to shut out other nations as far as she could from trading with China, managed to sell but little to the latter. It reads strangely that just before the war the imports of China from the United States were twelve times as great as from Russia while the Chinese imports from Great Britain were twenty-five times as great as from Russia. The nations who will profit most by the opening of additional ports are Japan, Britain, the United States, Germany and France.
