At Donaldton, a house owned by John Morris was struck on the flag and the lightning passed through the house breaking windows, destroying plaster, tearing up the floor and scattering the potatoes in the cellar. Mr. Morris and his servant man who alone occupied the house were milking at the time and thus escaped.
