The annual meeting of the Montague sub-division of the Catholic Women's League was held in the League Rooms on Thursday evening May 2nd.

The President who occupied the chair was Mrs. M. J. Hynes. The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved. This was followed by an address by the President and reports from Conveners of standing committees.

These officers were installed by the retiring President Mrs. H. J. Hynes, who was pleased to speak words of commendation and encouragement to the new officers and members and thanked them for the co-operation he had always received from the League.

The following is the Secretary's address:

**SECRETARY'S ADDRESS**

Madam President, Officers and Members: Another year has just closed in the history of our sub-division and as secretary it is my duty to give an account of the work accomplished since the last annual meeting.

The total amount of cash received during the year may seem small compared with former years, but our members were called upon and paid to the many collections made necessary by the war. On this account our money-making activities were curtailed. As has always been the case, the money expended was for worthy purposes, endeavoring to swell the fund established for painting the church.

The treasury was maintained by an ice-cream social, pantry sales, bingo and card parties. At the request of the ladies of the parish a collection was taken up in place of the annual supper and bazaar. Articles for lottery are now on hand and will be used at an early date. Besides contributing to the painting fund as already mentioned we have paid our National and Diocesan Fees, also Budget contribution; \$5.00 to the Sisters of St. Martha Building Fund; \$2.00 to Tuberculosis League and \$2.00 to the Chinese mission at Vancouver.

We have faithfully carried out the rules set down when the sub-division was formed, by having a Mass offered on April 26th, the feast of our Patroness for the living members and in November for the deceased in Purgatory. Also masses for deceased members and relatives of members.

Social Services: The demands on this committee were not of a humorous as one would expect to find in a town of this size. On a few occasions however, calls were received and were readily and cheerily answered. Among the deeds recorded by this committee we find: Nurse's services were procured, food and clothing given needy families, children of an Italian family were dressed and prepared for First Communion, visits were made to the sick and fruit and other articles sent on many occasions.

Education: The teaching of Catholicism and giving of prizes to Montague and Greenfield schools were the outstanding features of this committee. Catechism classes have been well attended and the children take a keen interest in The Little Flower Club. Last year by fraternal games they were able to ransom a Chinese baby and at present they are banking their pennies for another baby.

As was the case last year our Study Club took the form of study groups. Most of those groups were well attended and proved both interesting and instructive. This subject studied was "Christian Education of Youth". This was supplemented by other religious literature followed by a social hour. The need for enlightened and well-informed Catholics is growing more and more urgent every day. As women exercise a tremendous influence in all matters of public opinion, it is expedient that they be prepared to come with current problems intelligently. Reading and study are important. Attendance at the weekly study club is a means whereby the busy housewife may improve her education by listening to the instruction and taking part in the discussion. Above all she is combining with the wishes of His Lordship the Bishop and the Parish Priest by doing her share of Catholic Action. Here I would like to suggest that mothers would do well to supervise children's reading, try to encourage the reading of Catholic papers and periodicals instead of the "Comics", which we find taking a leading part with the young people at the present time.

Church: The Convener of this

committee and her assistants were most active in caring for the church during the year. A washing line, linens, a collection was taken up and flowers and other articles were purchased for the decoration of the altar at Easter and on other festive occasions.

Representatives from this sub-division attended the Eucharistic Congress at Indian River also the Diocesan Convention held at Notre-Dame Academy. A full report of same was given at the October meeting.

A number of members attended a "show" at the home of Mrs. Jerome Power in honor of Miss Catherine Corcoran prior to her entering the St. Martha Novitiate and presented her with a suitable gift. Gifts were also presented to former members on the occasion of their marriage.

Invitations were received from the Red Cross Society and the T. B. League to attend meetings. Delegates attended the latter meeting and we were honored by one of our members being appointed on the executive.

The outbreak of war in Europe and the declaration of war by Canada in September made more extensive Red Cross work necessary. Consequently all women were asked to register for active service at home. A list of members willing to serve by knitting and sewing for the soldiers was forwarded to the Diocesan President.

During the year eleven regular and two executive meetings were held. All correspondence was answered. Letters of congratulation were written when occasion demanded. Mass Cards and messages of sympathy were sent to members and friends who suffered bereavement.

In conclusion I wish to express the appreciation of the sub-division to our Chaplain, Father Higgins for his good advice and wise counsel. We regret that circumstances did not permit his attendance at our meetings. To the President and her staff for their efforts in

Awful Destruction In Rotterdam

ROTTERDAM, May 23 (AP) - German-held Rotterdam, proud former home of The Netherlands merchant fleet, is only a scar of a city - its main business and financial district a pile of bricks and mortar serving as headquarters for hundreds of dead.

The historic harbor, the smoke of war rising above it, is a silent testimony to the awful destruction which German dive bombers work.

Block after block of piled bricks, news of destruction broken here and there by occasional battered walls or twisted webs of girders, show how heavy a hand was laid on the land of the tulips and woaden

shoes.

Some of the biggest banks are nothing but heaps of mortar and twisted girders. Old financial institutions, historic business houses, lie in dust. The once-tasteful liner Rotterdam smolders at its wharf. Rotterdam became a battlefield the first day of the German western offensive.

Observers said that the dive bombers screamed down toward the heart of the city from a great height to about 1,200 feet to unload their bombs, swerved, and climbed up again.

The placid Hollanders are dazed by the sorrow, destruction and
