Rule 6 states that no member of any household where measles exists shall be permitted to mingle with children in schools, churches, or other public places.

There is a penalty of \$40.00 for failure to obey the rules.

The Board of Health requests all citizens to comply with the regulations at once, and assist in stamping out the disease.

The election of officers of Lodge Eton, Sons of England, has been deferred until Wednesday evening, December 13th.

H. G. Rolfe, General Superintendent of the Electrical Department, Moncton, is in the City on an official trip and is at the Victoria. Mr. Rolfe states that he finds everything in the electrical line in the P.E.I.R. shops in fine condition. He leaves tomorrow morning for Moncton.

A. E. Ings, City, has donated to St Paul's Church in memory of his parents, a handsome brass rail and book stands for the communion table. The design is artistic and the workmanship of a very high class. A brass memorial table, has also been placed over the vestry door.

Alpha Rebekah Lodge, No. 10, I. O. O. F., of this city was favoured with an official visit from the President of the Rebekah Assembly for the Maritime Provinces, Miss Mary Essory, city on Tuesday night. The evening was taken up with exemplification of degree works, for which the President warmly complimented the members of the degree team for the efficient manner in which they had acquitted themselves in their work. At the conclusion an oyster supper was served and impromptu speeches none the less interesting by reason of the adjective by members of the Lodge closed the evening's program.

J. A. Mathieson, Inspector of Fisheries, has received from the Department at Ottawa, the standard of requirements for lobster canneries. These requirements have to do with the style of packing, the method of handling the pack, the type of equipment to be used, provisions for cleanliness, purity, the disposal of offal, abundant water supply, water tight floors, adequate ventilation etc. Hereafter licenses will be granted to new lobster canneries which meet with certain requirements and the existing canneries must comply with such requirements within two years from Dec 31st, '10, otherwise licenses will not be continued.

In the LeBlanc murder trial which is now in progress in Boston, in which much interest is being taken by provincialists, Dr. W. N. Cousins, a native of this province, was called on to give evidence. The following is clipped from an exchange—Judge Pond decided to repeat his method of writing evidence before allowing it to be submitted to the jury. This evidence was given by Dr. W. N. Cousins, who owned the private hospital where Glover died. Dr. Cousins told of calling Mrs. Glover by telephone of her coming to the hospital, of her refusal to see her husband, and of her going away with the report that she benefited in case of Glover's death. Later there came an enquiry by phone as to Glover's condition, and whether he had implicated his wife in the shooting. Judge Pond then overruled the district attorney by deciding that the jury might hear the evidence against Mrs. Glover, and the twelve men filed in. Dr. Cousins repeated his testimony under cross-examination by Mr. Johnson.

The funeral of the late Miss Josephine Pineau, New Glasgow, took place on Sunday afternoon at 3.45 from her home to St. Augustine Church and cemetery. The funeral was largely attended and the services at the house and grave were conducted by Rev. Father Chasson. The pallbearers were:—Maurice Pineau, Louis Pineau, Augustine Dorion, Sylvester Martin and Joseph Gallant. The late Miss Pineau was only in her nineteenth year and was the youngest daughter of the late Louis and Mrs. Pineau, of New Glasgow. She was of kind and affectionate disposition and was dearly loved by her brothers and sisters, and indeed by all with whom she became acquainted. Her death came very suddenly and when the news was broken to the relatives away from home it came as a great shock to which its unexpectedness was an added source of grief. She is survived by three brothers and two sisters:—Napoleon and Joseph, abroad, and Moise of this city, and Katie and Priscilla at home. To all of these The Guardian extends sympathy.
