CITY COUNCIL

They should go slow in the matter. Mr. Walker thought that the matter might be decided there and then, and Mr. Taylor suggested the holding of a special meeting for the purpose—a view with which Mr. Campbell agreed.

In reply to Mr. Taylor, the Mayor said he thought the city were willing to give the company a free site, free water and exemption from taxation, and he thought the citizens would support the Council in the matter. At the last city election the Councilors pledged themselves to give some support to any new business opening here. The letter from Mr. Full, of course, required some consideration also.

The motion was carried for the matter to be referred to the committee dealing with it, for their immediate consideration, and report to the Council.

A letter was read that informed the Council that beginning on August 19th there was to be held in Charlottetown a Union meeting of all lodges of the Brotherhood of Railway and Intercolonial Railway, and that they had arranged to hold a public reception to be addressed by the Mayor and Hon. J. A. Matheon and different members of the brotherhood and sister brotherhoods, also a few musical numbers and the emblematic lecture of the Brotherhood, and asking the Council to grant them for the occasion the use of the Market Hall and secure them the use of the Magic lantern machine in the alternative to make them a grant of money sufficient to defray the expenses thereof which would amount to about \$30 or \$35.

This letter was referred to the Market Committee.

One of the city employes, James Bradley, applied by letter for an increase of wages to \$1.50 per day, pointing out that the increased cost of living made it difficult for him to support himself and family on the present wages he received, and that she ordinary wages of a laboring man in Charlottetown were now more than he was at present receiving.

The letter was taken for notification, as also a communication with respect to the Cartier Centenary from the Mayor and others of Montreal, asking for a subscription from the Council for the Centenary Fund.

From Miss Hanna, of 319 Fitzroy street, a letter was read in which the writer brought before the Council the fact that she had sustained "a bad break on her right foot a fortnight last Monday" for which she had to be attended by Dr. Yeo, who put the foot in plaster paris, and "I have suffered something awful." "I want some support from the city to pay damages for the last time I had to keep my brother from his work to look after the house. If you want any more particulars you can apply to Dr. Yeo."

This little matter was also referred to the consideration of the Recorder, on the motion of Mr. McKenna, seconded by Mr. McNevin.

Signed by close on half a hundred retail dealers of the city was the following letter which was next submitted:—

Oil into the dealers' store tanks. This system has been interrupted by the imposition of a license fee which the Imperial Oil Company state they business will not stand, and in order to avoid loss they have withdrawn their team and tank wagon from service to the Charlottetown trade. We, the undersigned, who suffer by this inconvenience and extra expense to our business, ask your honorable body to grant us a license fee or commensurate with the Charlottetown business. We have discussed the matter with the agent of the Imperial Oil Co., who informs us that his company pays regular taxes and would not be adverse to paying an ordinary license fee in proportion to the Charlottetown business, say about \$50, but, if they continued the business and service and paid a tax such as now is imposed they would be forced materially to increase the price of kerosine oil in Charlottetown. Since the tank wagon service has been introduced in this city, the loss by shrinkage has been largely reduced, and therefore the saving to the retail merchant has been considerable, also the price of oil has been much lower than heretofore.

"If we are now forced back to the old system, not only the trade but the consumer will suffer by the necessary increase in the price of oil."

This letter was referred to the Finance Committee of the Council.

A letter was read from the Committee of the Royal Edward Chapter Daughters of the Empire, transmitting to the Council the following resolution adopted at a meeting of the Chapter recently: It having been brought to the notice of this Chapter the improper conduct of young persons of both sexes which takes place nightly at the Victoria Park and other places of public resort, be it resolved that we request the Mayor and City Councilors to take the matter into their most serious consideration, and suggest that special officers in plain clothes be appointed to patrol these places every evening." The committee expressed their confidence in the Council's seeing the urgent need of prompt action and drastic measures being taken.

Mr. McKenna proposed and Mr. McNevin seconded that the letter should be referred to the Police Committee.

The Mayor thought they should take some immediate action upon it— if they referred it to the Police Committee it might hang fire.

The Recorder pointed out the impracticability of sending out men especially to the Park on what he described as an expedition. From twelve o'clock at night to daylight the next morning there were only two men on duty in the town. He promised, however, to investigate and find out the circumstances.

The motion was carried.

Two or three other letters of no special interest were laid on the table.

The Mayor asked Councilor Walker whether he had anything to report about the Band playing in the square.

and the Councilor's reply was that the committee dealing with the matter had not been able to come to any agreement with any of the different bands, although they had done the best they could do. The Band did not seem to be satisfied, and he understood that with the Fourth Regiment it was just a matter of the money voted not being considered sufficient. He had asked the three band masters to meet the Council there that night and discuss the matter, but they had not turned up. If they did not want to do anything in the matter, the Council could not force them.

It was agreed that the Band-masters should be asked to meet the Mayor to-day and discuss the matter with him.

The meeting then terminated.

The chairman said that the quarantine department might be brought to bear in the matter.

Mr. Cox: Either that or putting a heavy tax on the foxes. But I don't think that will interfere with the black fox business. The imported foxes he had seen were of such inferior quality that it would be useless for a man to go in for that kind, and there was plenty of stock in the island and for people to buy if they wanted to go in for the black fox business. Plenty of silver and dark patches; and it would be better for them to go in for it by buying the good stock here than the ill-bred things imported. That was if they wished to start in a moderate way of raising stock and getting into the black fox business cheaply. They could do it better in that way than by buying the imported red twattle imported from abroad.

The chairman said that the idea was that the effect it would have on the other side, not so much here where they knew all about it. The people were fearing that the reports going abroad would affect the industry in the eyes of the people abroad.

Dr. Ross said that danger lay in the fact that foxes were imported here, kept here for four years or so, and then sold as being genuine pure bred foxes. He thought that the government, without injuring the trade in any way, could take steps to open a register that would give them some sort of authority with regard to those sales. He did not see that any steps could be taken to prevent the importation of those animals, and instead of trying to stop the importation, there might be some means of registering by which the animals imported could be traced, and then a man would know exactly what he was buying. In the importation of foxes from abroad the real danger he thought, lay in the importation with them of contagious diseases. That danger was more pressing and real than they imagined it to be, and it would be wisdom on their part to take the most stringent measures they could to prevent such diseases coming in among their own healthy stock. There was no way of guard-

ing against the importation of diseases than by establishing a system of stringent quarantine.

Mr. Dennis also expressed the opinion that the best they could do in the matter was to try and get the Government to establish a method of quarantine.

Mr. Rogers considered that the widest publicity they could give the matter would have the best effect they might desire, as a man who was buying stock would know pretty well what he was buying.

Mr. G. E. Hughes read an extract from an Edmonton paper indicating that the Island was becoming the dumping ground for all Albertan foxes and suggesting that some restrictions should be put on the export. Mr. Hughes did not think that was the sort of reputation the Island should be formed to protect the local industry. A great deal of money had been invested in foxes here, and those who had formed companies had a duty to their shareholders in protecting the reputation of the Island as a fox-raising centre. If an association were formed they could ask the Government for quarantine regulations or the imposition of a tax or whatever was necessary to protect the industry.
