WINS BURSARY.—In order to perpetuate the memory of the men and women who gave their lives in defence of the Empire in the great war, the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire has inaugurated a war memorial which includes bursaries in Canadian universities, overseas postgraduate scholarships and the placing of historical pictures in schools.

The winner of the Canadian bursary in New Brunswick this year is Ralph H. McKee, of Fredericton son of Lance Corporal G. H. McKee of the 26th New Brunswick Battalion who died in active service in 1915.

As there was no candidate in Prince Edward Island, this bursary was awarded to Charles M. Jones, of Dalhousie, N. B., son of Major Jones, of the 132nd Battalion, C. E. F.

**Marie Prevost is Brilliant As Gay Super-Flapper**

Filmplay of "Beautiful and Damned" Full of Glitter and Color.

Marie Prevost's latest picture "The Beautiful and Damned" played before a delighted audience yesterday at the Prince Edward Theatre, where this Warner Brothers production opened for a run of an entire week.

As Gloria Gilbert, the flapper who plays herself into the hearts of a dozen men, Miss Prevost is excellent. The former bathing beauty's delicious sense of humor is in evidence throughout the situations of this rollicking picture of gilded youth, riches and ruin.

All who came in expectation of something out-of-the-way were not disappointed, for this is a screen adaptation of F. Scott Fitzgerald's best seller of the same name which intrigued thousands of readers, and which, as a picture, is crammed with humor, tense drama, and strong situations—a sparkling fast-moving story that has lost not one whit of its brilliance in the screen version.

As Anthony Patch, the boy-husband, Kenneth Harlan was admirable in the lead opposite Marie Prevost.

Take a handful of fascinating flappers, a crotchety aged millionaire bent on reforming the world, a young weak-willed but lovable spendthrift, a musical comedy courtesan, a successful film magnate—mix well with the best that New York can offer in cabarets, jazz music and phandering and you have the ingredients that go to make "The Beautiful and Damned" both a surprising and entertaining picture that you will have to go far to beat.

Briefly, the story deals with Gloria Gilbert the loveliest flapper in New York—a 1922 model. Men woo her and fall; at last she surrenders to young Anthony Patch, whose mission in life seems to be to wait 'till his wealthy philanthropist grandfather dies and leaves him his millions.

**Miss Margery Wilson Noted Screen Star Arrives in City**

Miss Margery Wilson, of New York, noted moving picture actress who is to appear at the Strand Theatre this week in connection with the exhibition of her own picture, "Insinuation," arrived on the early train last night and is a guest at the Victoria Hotel. Miss Wilson was met at the station by Manager Gallagher and quite a number of citizens with whom she chatted pleasantly, expressing great pleasure with what she had so far seen of the Island. She was particularly interested in what she heard of Island silver black foxes and hopes to visit some ranches during her brief stay here.

To occupy stellar roles on the screen would seem to be sufficient honor for any actress, but Miss Wilson was not satisfied with premier honors in acting, and has turned her attention and talent to the production of pictures of which she writes the scenarios, directs the action, and plays the part, then, with a keen business ability, markets her own productions.

Miss Wilson, who made her debut in the pictures as the little girl who played the part of Brown Eyes, the fugitive maid, in the third episode of "Intolerance," David Griffith's masterpiece of a few years ago, has had a very successful career since the auspicious start, playing opposite Douglas Fairbanks, Charles Ray, William S. Hart and other stars of the first magnitude. Against the advice of her friends, as she laughingly told the reporter, she decided to make her pictures to suit herself, believing that she understood the clean demands of the public for photographs of a high order.

Accordingly, she developed her own plot, writing the scenario and gathering her own company, produced her first picture, "Insinuation," a few months ago. The production is said to have been a success from the start, and to have repaid Miss Wilson abundantly for her confidence in her ability to please popular demand.

In connection with the presentation of "Insinuation," Miss Wilson has personally appeared at many of the theatres where it has been played, and according to members of her party, she has always delighted her audiences. She appears this afternoon at the Strand Theatre for the first time in Charlottetown.
