BOSTON RAISES HALF MILLION FOR INDUSTRIES

BOSTON, December, 6.—A fund of a half a million dollars for the purpose of bringing new industries to Boston has been raised among local public-spirited citizens and will be administered under the control of the Industrial Development Company of the Boston Chamber of Commerce, according to an announcement made at yesterday's meeting of the company. This enterprise is unique in the country's economic history.

"Ten per cent. of this fund has already been called in from the guarantors and deposited in the bank for the use of the company, while six applicants for the benefits of the company, out of a total of more than 10, will be considered at a meeting of the loan committee this afternoon."

"Briefly described, the new company is an organization to investigate the merits of such business enterprises as wish to locate in Boston and, unable to secure credit from the bank. The method of operation will be as follows: A man desiring money, and finding that he cannot obtain it at the bank, goes to the chamber of commerce. The chamber has an industrial development committee, distinct from the development company."

"The committee will make a preliminary inquiry into the merits of the proposition. If it is found impracticable to give the assistance sought, the man is so notified. If on the other hand, it seems meritorious and worthy of more careful study, it is turned over to the loan committee of the Industrial Development Company. This committee makes a thorough study, and if convinced the industry is desirable and seems likely to succeed recommends it to the executive committee of the Development company. The executive committee gives the applicant endorsement on his note."

"The active and only salaried official of the company will be its secretary, Mr. Pierce. Mr. Pierce since his graduation from Bowdoin in 1898 has been in the traffic department of the Pere Marquette railroad. For the past seven years he has been its New England agent, with headquarters in Boston. All the other officers serve without pay."

"The list of subscribers is representative of all business interests in Boston. Headed by many of the business houses which are represented on the Board of Directors, it includes men from practically all lines of activity, retailers, wholesalers, manufacturers, financiers, gain dealers, newspaper publishers, philanthropists. The subscriptions range from \$1000 to \$10,000 each."

"President Storow declared after yesterday's meeting that only time would show the success or failure of the innovation. 'I can only say that our merchants, bankers, business men and in fact practically every one we have asked has come forward and in the most liberal manner and subscribed the \$500,000 guarantee fund' he said. 'It is also true that without a single declination every single business man or banker whom we have asked to contribute not merely his money but his time by serving on the Board of Directors or as an officer or as a member of the loan committee, has promptly shown his interest in the city, his willingness to back up the chamber of Commerce in any constructive effort for the benefit of the city and his desire to aid the young men who perhaps possess limited means but have plenty of capital in the form of character, knowledge of what they are going to undertake and determination to work hard.'

"The enterprise must be looked at as something of an experiment. It is clear if we lose the money which has been so generously subscribed we shall fail because the attempt must then end. If on the other hand we are not willing to take some substantial risks in backing young men of insufficient means we shall only be doing what the banks are doing, and we shall have contributed substantially nothing to the city of Boston. It is also true that we must disappoint many worthy and ambitious men, who do not appreciate their own personal limitations, or the defects of the business scheme which they present."

"All I can say that we are going to try hard to steer down the middle of the road without ditching the vehicle on either side."
