### Atomic Research Will Cost Canada Millions

HALIFAX, April 15 (CP)—Expenditure of millions of dollars will be necessary if Canada is to hold her place in atomic research, Dr. G. Laurence, a member of the National Research Council staff at the Chalk River, Ont., atomic energy pilot plant said here tonight.

In an address prepared for delivery at a meeting of the Engineering Institute of Canada, Dr. Laurence, who is a native of Charlottetown, said difficult scientific and technical problems remained to be solved and one of the greatest difficulties in this regard was in finding young scientists.

"There is a full-scale experimental plant to be built," he said. "As taxpayers we must realize that our niggardly pre-war support of research is not enough. Research and development in the next few years if we are to have the benefits in Canada, may cost us many millions of dollars, whereas the United States will spend hundreds of millions of dollars for the same purpose."

At one point in his address Dr. Laurence hinted that lack of adequate funds had hampered Canada's atomic research.

With "typical Canadian thriftiness" uranium oxide had been hoarded from the Eldorado Mining and Refining Company and 10 tons of petroleum coke "the price of which is high" could not be used in experiments which were inconclusive because the materials were not pure enough and quantities were too small.

"Measurements of U.S. experiments with a good quality of material in place of the coke dust substance," he said.

The Chalk River plant, which was purely a pilot project and of little military importance, was designed for the production of plutonium and other isotopes for use in the treatment of cancer, including cancer, and the plant would shortly be producing radioactive materials for that purpose at a cost much below that of the United States.

Plans already being made for handling and distribution of the plutonium and other isotopes for a time, he said, the most powerful source of neutron radiation in existence.

### Bitter U. N. Debate Over Iranian Issue

(By The Canadian Press) NEW YORK, April 15 (AP)—The United Nations Security Council adjourned tonight after a bitter three-hour debate in which seven of the 11 members opposed Russia's move to have the Council expand the Iranian case from its agenda.

### Predicts Black Market In Bread In The United States

WASHINGTON, April 15 (AP)—A "black market and black market prices" in bread and bakery products was forecast today by John T. McCarthy, president of the American Bakers Association, if the Government forces a 15 per cent slash in supplies of wheat and flour for bakers and millers.

### Ilisley Backs Up Action Of Prices Board

OTTAWA, April 15 (CP)—Finance Minister Ilisley said tonight in the Commons that the Government had not put the cart before the horse in allowing a 12-1-3 per cent increase in the price of farm products at present when the price of farm products at present was up over 1941 figures all along the line.

They included these percentage increases: wheat, 67; oats, 65; barley, 62; and due to go up to 70 per cent in 1945. The increase in milk, 40; fluid milk, 28; butter, 28; and eggs, 28.

Mr. Bracken's Contention As the House opened this afternoon Opposition Leader John Bracken immediately took the side of the farmer as against the manufacturers of farm implements.

### Will Probe Details Of Car Ferry Deficit In Commons Committee

OTTAWA, Ont., April 15 (Special)—Opportunity for open discussion of Prince Edward Island's transportation problems is to be afforded the special committee of the Commons on railways and shipping owned and controlled by the Government following a motion passed by the House today.

In tabling the annual and the quarterly reports of the Canadian National Railways, Transport Minister Chevrier moved that vote 469 totalling \$77,000 be allocated to be applied in payment of the deficit in the operation of the Prince Edward Island car ferry and terminals arising in the calendar year 1946.

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### N. S. To Aid Tourist Hotels

HALIFAX, April 15 (CP)—Capital estimates totalling \$12,350,000 were tabled in the Nova Scotia Legislature tonight as the House prepared to pass a bill to assist in the construction of rural tourist hotels.
