would pay a part, but it also made provision for setting up national employment agencies across Canada so that when a worker became unemployed, these agencies would seek to get him or her another job. It is expected that the new bill will also have similar provisions. It has been suggested that employment services are a necessary tie-up with unemployment insurance so that when the unemployment insurance was added to the Dominion's jurisdiction, the British employment services were added automatically without being specially mentioned in the amendment to the B. N. A. Act.

Little Debate In London

LONDON, July 10.—(CP)—Parliament today completed action on a bill amending the British North America Act to empower the Canadian Parliament to enact an unemployment insurance plan. The bill passed through all stages in the House of Commons and Lords and received royal assent. There was little debate. Sir William Jowitt, solicitor general, told the Commons that the British Parliament was merely carrying out the wishes of the Canadian Parliament which sought an extension of its powers to deal comprehensively with the problem of unemployment insurance. Sir William said that under the Statute of Westminster Canada was given full sovereignty over her own affairs and that "we are morally bound to act on this case on the ground we have here a request from the Dominion Parliament that we should do so."

Significance Seen In British Naval Initiative

(By Kirke L. Simpson, Associated Press Staff Writer)
WASHINGTON, July 10.—(AP)—The war has flamed into action in the Mediterranean theatre on the British initiative. That is the most salient fact of the current war news. It outweighs in significance the outburst of the brush between British and Italian naval forces in the Balkan storehouse of the Axis, or German air and submarine attack on Britain's sea life lines. A striking British naval success over Italy, at this juncture might shift the whole scene on the eastern war stage. It could powerfully influence the attitude of Turkey, of Greece, even of Russia. It could defeat the purposes of the Axis-Hungarian conferences at Munich and confront Hitler and Mussolini with increased, not lessened, economic menace at their Balkan back door. Whatever it means, the sea and air clash in the Mediterranean is a stirring new notice that Britain means to fight to the bitter end. It also heavily underscores intimidation by Prime Minister Churchill that Britain does not propose to fight only on the defensive.

King's Birthday Honors List Announced

LONDON, July 10.—(CP Cable)—Scores of names which have appeared in the war news were repeated tonight in the military section of the King's birthday honours list. His Majesty bestowed awards for meritorious service and bravery.

Dutch Tanker Is Torpedoed

LISBON, July 10.—(AP)—The Netherlands tanker Lucrecia, manned by a Holland crew, commanded by British officers, was torpedoed and sunk July 7, 100 miles southwest of England, survivors said on landing today. Portuguese officials said. Thirty were brought ashore by the Portuguese freighter Alferrade. The tanker was killed and the first officer fatal injured in the explosion. One member of the crew died after being brought ashore. Four others were hurt seriously. The tanker was bringing oil from Curacao to Britain.
