POLICE COURT—At the Police Court Saturday morning six motorists charged with operating motor vehicles without licenses were each fined \$1 court costs, and each given \$5 suspended.
EXCEPTIONALLY FINE CORN—Mr. Alexander McKay, East Royalty, has an exceptionally fine field of corn grown from seed purchased from Messrs Carter and Co. There stalks measure 12 feet 6 inches with cobs of 14 inch; while the whole field averages 11 feet with cobs of 11 inches. This is a magnificent growth as may be seen by any one passing along St. Peter's Road towards Wright's Bridge.

PROHIBITION COURT—The defendant in an adjudged case for the unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor was fined \$200 and costs or five months before Magistrate Tweedy Saturday morning. The defendant in this case, it was given in evidence was pursued out Spring Park Road early this summer by the prohibition officers and, driving his car in an accident escaped. The defendant in another case tried under the Customs Act, confessed and was fined \$100. The seizure in this case had been made on Friday evening at Tracadie when twenty bottles of wine, three bottles of Scotch and a part bottle of rum was seized by the officers.
WELCOME EXTENDED—Mr. George Walker, the new physical director of the Y. M. C. A., and Mrs. Walker were given an official welcome to the association Thursday night, says the Mosejaw Daily Times. Sixty members of the leaders corps, directors and members of the physical department committee were present to bring the greetings of "the friendly city." Following the welcome, the chairman, "Hub" Guthridge, presented the various leaders with the stars and emblems they had recently won in the annual Y. M. C. A. exam-

inations. On behalf of the senior leaders' corps and the young men's class, Mr. Guthridge assured the new physical director of the support of the leaders. W. F. Dunn, K. C., on behalf of the business men, welcomed Mr. and Mrs. Walker. Mr. A. E. Davey, who has three boys who have all been members of the "Y" for several years, gave a welcome on behalf of the parents of the city, while Mr. A. W. Irwin brought greetings from the Board of Directors, and E. J. Glensk from the staff.
INTEREST FOCUSED ON IMPERIAL CONFERENCE
 (Canadian Press)
 LONDON, Sept 27—The official Monthly Bulletin of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce in Great Britain says of the Imperial Conference.
 "Now that the Canadian election is a matter of history, attention in the Dominion, as throughout the Empire, is being focussed on the forthcoming Imperial Conference which will, it is expected, prove of greater importance than any of its predecessors. Turn where one will in the Empire, economic conditions give cause for deep anxiety. The problems are many, interests are conflicting but it may be taken for granted that each and all of the delegates will attend with the sin-

cere intention of contributing, so far as is possible to the success of the Conference. There must be a willingness to compromise. Half a loaf is better than none.
 "The British Government is now in receipt of the report of the British Preparatory Committee, which was representative of important organizations in Great Britain, and was presided over by Sir Gilbert Vyle. This report will be of great assistance to the members of the Conference, as will also be the report on "Unemployment" presented by the Council of the Association of British Chambers of Commerce. The report dealing with unemployment says: "In the interests of unemployment in this country (Great Britain) it is essential that every effort should be made in collaboration with the Dominions and Colonies to extend inter imperial trade and to encourage greatest possible exchange of commodities between the different parts of the Empire." That is what we all want. The difficulty is to bring it about and that is why the forthcoming Conference is regarded as of much importance. Delegates to the Conference could not have a better preparation for its deliberation than a careful study of Professor Leacock's latest volume, "Economic Prosperity of the British Empire," recently published by Messrs. Constable."

NEW PAPER CURRENCY IN GERMANY
 (Canadian Press)
 BERLIN, Sept 29—The Germans, this fall, are going to be presented with a new kind of paper money that has some remarkable claims made for it. It is a new type of paper currency guaranteed not to burn, tear, or crumble.
 The new notes will be thoroughly workmanlike. The ten-mark and twenty-mark denominations will be made from steel-engraved plates. The former will bear "an agricultural design" and the latter a pattern of industrial inspiration. In a white circle a distinguishing water-mark will show when the paper is held up against the light.
 The money will be made non-flammable by spraying it with a metal. If it becomes the general fashion to fireproof paper money in this way some of our most cherished expressions will have to go.
 The rich will no longer have "money to burn," and the extravagant will not be able to offer the excuse that their money "burns a hole in their pockets." And to "run through money" which is non-tearable" will be impossible.
 The real point, of course, is that this fall "Germans armed with a wad of bills that will not burn, tear or crumble, may find their money lasting well, even under the west-

and tear of a Christmas-shopping season."
POTAGE MILLE FANTI
 1-2 gallon bouillon.
 2 cups fresh bread crumbs (very fine).
 2 ounces grated Parmesan cheese.
 3 eggs.
 Nutmeg.
 Pepper.
 Salt.
 Beat the eggs as for an omelette. Mix the bread crumbs and the grated cheese together in a bowl. Add the beaten eggs to this mixture. Add pepper, salt and a pinch of nutmeg.
 Have the bouillon on the stove boiling. Add the mixture of beaten eggs and bread crumbs and cheese to it, whipping it constantly. Cover the bouillon and let it boil slowly eight minutes.
 Before serving, whip it again thoroughly.
