### SCIENTISTS MEET TO OPPOSE ALCOHOL

MILAN, Sept. 24, (Special).—Storza Castle, an historic pile, will be the meeting place for the next few days of large delegations of scientists and others who are opposed to the use of alcohol. Delegates from thirty countries, of whom Americans and Englishmen predominate, are now here to attend the Fourteenth International Congress on Alcoholism.

### CURIOS SHIP BUILDING ON SEINE.

According to the Paris correspondent of the London Daily News, an extraordinary craft is being completed under one of the archways of the Point St. Michael on the Seine. With the greatest mystery, two men are working on the construction of the model of a cylindrical bottle-shaped vessel, which, they believe will carry across the Atlantic at the rate of a hundred miles an hour. The vessel is of wood and tarred cardboard, with strong hoops of iron. It is about 30 feet long by 7 1/2 feet across. There is a man hole at each end.

The master of this curious craft is turned 70, and wears a blue suit with no shirt underneath, and no shoes on his feet. His long curls have evidently known no barber's shears for many a long year for they reach to his shoulders and mingle with his patriarchal beard of snow white. The old man is a Greek, Constantine Panajotti by name. His father was a business man and left him a comfortable little fortune, which he now devotes to alleviating the sufferings of his less favored compatriots. Mr. Panajotti's wants are few. He lives on crusts, dried vegetables, and boiled water, with no salt or butter. He spends most of his spare moments in prayer. His only assistance in his work on the Seine is a young workman.

"The craft is now on the slip" M. Panajotti, remarked to representatives of the Petit Parisien, "is only a model. Later I propose to build another measuring 325 feet, and driven by three fifteen horse power motors, which will develop a speed of 100 miles an hour."

"The secret of my invention lies in the action of the propeller, which will enable my bottle to revolve on its own axis at a dizzy rate. The persons inside will be on the floor fitted with rollers which will remain completely stable. My pupil and I intend to go from Paris to Harve and thence to New York."

"My boat," he added, has no keel, and is so constructed that a leak is sprung, a stroke of the propeller causes it to turn upside down and a leak can be repaired without the least danger.

### THE "DUNES" OF OLD

The word dunce now means exactly the reverse of what it meant originally. Dunces were originally a term applied to a very wise man. Some 600 years ago there lived a philosopher whose name was Duns. He was the leader of a certain number of thinkers and scholars who were known as schoolmen, and those who followed him were known as Dunsmen, or Dunces. People in those days were not so careful of their spelling as we of a later date, and so they fell in the way of spelling the word with a "c" instead of an "s", so that Dunces soon was spelled Dunces. A dunce therefore signified a learned man and was a title much prized. After a certain time these dunces became very unpopular because of their scoffing at the teachings of others, especially who were progressive in their doctrines. They had a most conceited idea that they were the only wise men, and it was not very long before the word dunce became a word of reproach and signified a lack of good sense in the person to whom it was applied, and thus the word became reversed in meaning.
