## WOULD MAKE THE EMPIRE A SELF-SUSTAINING ONE "ALL RED ROUTE" URGES

### FIFTH INTERIM REPORT OF DOMINION'S ROYAL COMMISSION IS ISSUED DEALING TO A GREAT EXTENT WITH CANADA AND HER POSSIBILITIES.

#### DOMINION CAN SUPPLY TO GREAT EXTENT MINERALS, TIMBER AND STOCK FOR EMPIRE

As the result of five years' research work, the Dominion Royal Commission today issued its fifth interim report embodying the following suggestions:—

The development and utilization of imperial natural wealth on a well-considered scheme, so as to make the Empire independent of any pressure which a foreign power might exert.

Development of imperial mail routes along an "All Red Route," which will not traverse foreign territory, and the construction of harbors of uniform accommodation.

A permanent imperial development board to superintend scientific imperial development.

A co-ordinated mineral survey of the Empire.

The stimulation of cattle and sheep raising, particularly in the Dominion of Canada.

The establishing of a thoroughly complete imperial press service and cheap press rates over imperial cables.

The control of Canadian mineral wealth as far as possible by companies of British nationality.

The better development of Canada's most valuable forest resources.

The manufacture of synthetic fertilizers in the Dominion.

A uniform decimal currency throughout the Empire.

LONDON, March 5.—Co-ordination and co-relation of all the resources of the British Empire is the purpose of the Dominion's Royal Commission, now closing the fifth year of its existence, and the final report of which, inter-relating the features of all the Dominions and the United Kingdom is now at hand, issued contemporaneously with this report is the fifth interim report, the subject being Canada.

The commission, which consists of Sir Geo. E. Foster, Sir Edgar Vincent, Sir H. Rider Haggard, Tom Grenfell, Wm. Lorimer, Joseph Tatlow, Sir Alfred Bateman, Donald Campbell, J. R. Sinclair, Sir Richard Solomon and E. R. Bowring, points out that the action taken during the war to stimulate and control supplies of foodstuffs and raw materials illustrates the immense power which the governments of the United Kingdom and the overseas Dominions can exert to control the course of trade and the development of natural resources when necessary arises.

A definite object.

"The success of the action achieved during the war suggests that it is expedient that the various Governments of the Empire should take steps as soon as conditions permit," remarks the report, "to secure the development and utilization of their natural wealth on a well-considered scheme directed towards a definite and recognized object. In our opinion it is vital that the Empire should, so far as is possible, be placed in a position which would enable it to resist any pressure which a foreign power or group of powers could exercise in time of war in virtue of a control of raw materials and commodities essential for the well-being of the Empire, and it is towards the attainment of this object that co-ordinated effort should be directed."

A Permanent Board

The Commission has made a survey of the natural resources, commercial and industrial effort, and manpower of the Empire, and advocates the completion and continuance of the work under a permanent imperial development board representing all parts of the Dominions which should keep this survey up-to-date so that there may be a scientific development of the natural resources of the Empire.

As just one instance of what is proposed, the report says:

"In the case of minerals, a properly co-ordinated mineral survey of the Empire appears to be an urgent necessity. Further investigation is needed both in the case of minerals of which Empire supplies are unknown, and in the case of minerals already worked in order to determine the most economic means of production."

A Mineral Survey

It is mentioned by way of illustration that this Rio Tinto mines, of Spain, in 39 years' worked 7,000,000 tons of sulphur valued at 14,000,000 pounds. Now, through modern improvements, 1,000,000 tons of sulphur are saved annually which would otherwise only pollute the atmosphere.

Overseas Communications.

Not the least important phase of the commission's report deals with the subject of overseas communications, embracing uniform harbor development for the accommodation of vessels of the "All Red Route," draught required for the cheap and speedy transport of the empire's telegraphic communication.

The development of imperial mail routes which do not pass over foreign soil is advocated, and it is shown how by this means time may be saved in the delivery of mail in the Antipodes. It is suggested that Governments of the Dominions arrange matters so that in 1921, when the time for giving notice to terminate existing contracts expires, they may be ready to initiate imperial services.

Pedigree Stock.

It is pointed out that the Union of South Africa has placed in its contract with the Union-Castle Steamship Company a stipulation that the company shall carry free of freight pedigree stock. This has been attended with excellent results and the commission would like to see similar contracts inserted in other mail contracts which may be concluded in the future. It is pointed out that the United Kingdom is forced to draw largely upon foreign countries for its meat supplies. It sees a clear case for further stimulation of cattle breeding and sheep raising, particularly in Canada, where these industries are at present little developed.

"In our opinion," says the report, "steps should be taken to encourage the shipment of pedigree stock from the United Kingdom to the Dominion of Canada, and from the Dominion of Canada to other parts of the Empire. Our visits overseas were made in years of acute international disturbance. We are bound to say that our hopes of finding in the newspapers of the Dominion a full and accurate account of world-important events, were far from realized. In Canada particularly (where news from outside the Dominion comes mainly through American agencies) the lack of imperial news at the outset and during the progress of the war was noticeable and disturbing. In our judgment few tasks are more urgent than that of securing the dissemination of imperial news as widely and as fully as possible. We therefore recommend and advocate the lowest possible press rates for news sent over the state-controlled Atlantic and Pacific cables. We are confident that the already urgent demand for a better news service will be emphasized when the war is over and reconstruction begins."

Better News Service.

The commission deals appreciatively with the difficulties of news dissemination through the Dominion. "The present system," it says, "is the subject of much heart-burning both in eastern and western Canada, and is viewed with grave apprehension by newspaper proprietors and others interested in the future development of the Dominion and its relations to the Empire."

The reports sets out that there are four main news gathering centres—the Maritime provinces, Can-

tral Canada, the Prairie provinces and the British Columbia coast. Between these are three great news deserts, between St. John and Quebec, between Central Canada and Winnipeg (Fort William and Port Arthur forming an oasis, and between Calgary and Vancouver. Cost Unduly High.

"In these deserts," says the report, "news matter neither originates nor circulates. Moreover, owing to the long distances over which these 'deserts' extend the cost of transportation of news messages, which is done by means of leased telegraph wires, is unduly high."

It is remarked that it is found cheaper for Canadian newspapers to get much of their news from United States sources. The special service of the Canadian Associated Press, started in 1903 to supply Canadian newspapers with news of peculiar Canadian interest originating in the United Kingdom, is referred to as a daily average of from 500 to 600 words," says the report, "which was considered inadequate. In the main the collection and distribution of news is done by means of an association named the Canadian Press Limited.

The Commission declares that the most urgent need is that representatives of the Government, the principal papers and the telegraph companies get together and frame an agreement which would at least secure a leased wire from Ottawa to Winnipeg, and perhaps from end to end of the Dominion.

"It is keenly realized," says the report, "that the absence of an adequate imperial news service will constitute a serious danger during the period of reconstruction which will inevitably follow the war."

The commission declares itself greatly interested in the suggestion made at Winnipeg by Mr. Conley, of the Sydney Morning Herald, Australia, that Australian and Canadian newspapers should unite in the news service now supplied by the Australian Press Association in London to the Australian and New Zealand press.

The commission finds it regrettable that Canada's mineral assets should be owned so largely outside the Empire and adds that the present income received by the various provincial governments from the taxation of mineral wealth—a most valuable and ever wasting asset—appears wholly inadequate. The taxation is quite insignificant in comparison, for instance, with that levied in the union of South Africa.

A Valuable Asset

The forest resources of Canada, the commission admits, undoubtedly forms one of the most valuable assets of the empire. It doubts whether the provincial and federal forest reserves are as yet under an efficient and economic administration worthy of the vast natural wealth which they represent. It is pointed out that Canada is estimated to have between two and three hundred million acres of commercial timber but the output is approximately one that of Germany, where timber is cut on an area of 24,000,000 acres only. But the Canadian output is from lands which have taken a hundred years to bring to their present perfection as timber producers.

The possession of assets such as the Canadian Asbestos and Nickel supplies could be used by the Empire as a powerful means of economic defence. We desire to point out that though Canada is practically the only producer of raw asbestos on a large scale in the world, the United Kingdom is largely dependent on foreign sources, especially the United States, for the manufactured asbestos which it requires."

The commission emphasizes the fact that the water-power of Canada should place the Dominion in a favorable position for the production of synthetic nitrogen compounds, while the manufacture of potash from felspar by a hydro-electric process in Canada is contemplated.

Returned Soldiers

The report deals with migration, especially touching on the question of placing the returned soldiers upon the land, and assisting him by training and advancing him money as under the Ontario scheme.

An inter-imperial commercial intelligence system is advocated and the unification of legislation bearing upon trade such as the patent and trademarks law.

The decimal currency is advocated, the commission saying: "We are of the opinion that the termination of the war will bring with it an unequalled opportunity for securing this much needed reform, and we recommend that Your Majesty's Government and the governments of the overseas Dominions should then co-operate in the establishment throughout the empire of uniform coinage, weights and measures, based upon the metric system."
