THE NOVEMBER MEETING of the Cornwall-York Women's Institute was held at the home of Mrs. Dan McEwen, York Point, and was exceptionally well attended. Committees reported on purchasing of oil stove and necessary equipment; also that arrangements about building of cupboard had been delayed by sickness. The suggestions made by Miss McLeod, the Red Cross nurse, were reported and approved. Mrs. George MacDonald and Mrs. H. Frizzell were appointed to visit Cornwall school. A paper on "Health" was read by Mrs. Fred White and Mrs. Geo. MacAulay, who led to the discussion of various food values by the members. The meeting was closed in a very delightful way by the York Point members serving refreshments.

PROGRESSIVE MEETING—The meeting called by the National Progressive Party at Harrington Hall was fairly largely attended. Hall Robert Jenkins acted as chairman, which, for want of opposition speakers, was not a hard job. Mr. Jones, the first speaker, reviewed the history of the Progressive Party, which he claimed originated in the city of Toronto, thirteen years ago. The tariff question, then called, was of only minor importance. The Income Tax and the Luxury Tax, which has been abolished, were also good, whilst the sales tax as it is today bore too heavily on the poor people. The railway question was one which both he and Mr. J. J. McCarthy, as well as Mr. Ludlow Jenkins, who spoke later on, claimed was one of the vital issues in Canada today, and which neither of the old parties appeared to be able to handle satisfactorily. Together, Mr. Jones made a very favorable impression and judging by appearances that section of the country will give him good support.
