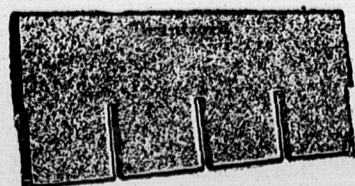

**\$360,000 Deficit
For Nova Scotia**

KENTVILLE, N. S., Nov. 15- (CP)—A deficit of \$360,000 in the Nova Scotia budget for 1936 was predicted by Premier Angus L. Macdonald before the Kings County Liberal Association here Saturday. The Premier said he expected to balance the budget in 1937. "Frugality has been practiced, the finances have been guarded, and our efforts are showing the results," said Mr. Macdonald, claiming the present administration was faced with a deficit of \$1,600,000 when it took office.

**Found Dead On
Railway Tracks**

WOODSTOCK, N. B. Nov. 16- (CP)—Trainmen found the mangled body of George Akerley on Canadian Pacific Railway tracks a mile from the station here today. An inquest was adjourned until next Sunday.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. EDWARD J. DESROCHE

On October 30th the angel of death visited the home of Edward J. DesRoche, and with startling suddenness claimed the head of the household.

Edward J. DeRoche was born in Tignish 42 years ago, the son of Fidele DesRoche and Hannah Profit. Except while in the service of the Canadian army, his life was spent in Tignish, where he held a responsible position, on the staff of J. H. Myrick and Co., Ltd., for a period of 26 years.

Besides his sorrowing widow he leaves to mourn two daughters, Felecia and Frances, and three sons, Gerard, James and Edward, a brother Ernest in New York, a sister Marguerite at home.

He was always a kind and affectionate brother, a loving and devoted husband; to his children he was father and friend, parent and pal, and happiest when at home by his own fireside with his family around him. He was a devoted member of the Roman Catholic Church, and past president of the Holy Name Society of his parish, a member of the Knights of Columbus, A. O. H., and secretary of the Tignish branch of the Canadian Legion, B. E. S. L.

In his business relations, "Eddie" (as his host of friends loved to call him) was esteemed and respected by all with whom he came in contact and his passing will be mourned not only by the people in general but his presence will be grievously missed by his employers and fellow employees.

His funeral was held on November 3rd under the auspices of the Canadian Legion, and was one of the largest held in Tignish parish. The funeral cortege was headed by the Knights of Columbus and members of the Canadian Legion. The honorary pall bearers were, Messrs. Michael Gaudet, Fred Gaudet, Joseph A. Gaudet, Octave Gaudet, Thomas LeClair and Joseph E. Gallant. The acting pall bearers were Messrs. George Marchbank, Henry Bernard, Fred Gallant, Michael DesRoche, John J. LeClair and Claude Kinch. High Mass of requiem was celebrated by his pastor, Rev. J. A. McDonald, who had also administered the last rites of the church previous to his demise, and conducted the services at the grave.

BUTTERED CORN AND ONIONS

6 medium sized onions
1 tin whole kernel corn
2 tablespoons butter

1-2 cup milk
Salt, paprika
Method: Slice the onions thin and cook in the melted butter until they are a pale straw color and yet tender. Add the corn and salt. Heat this, then add the milk and let the mixture come just to the boiling point. Turn into a hot serving dish and sprinkle with paprika.
A tablespoon of chopped pimiento or green pepper adds color and flavor to this dish. If you are using the green pepper, it should be chopped and pre-cooked with the onion.
