The following are additional particulars regarding the sad accident to Mrs. William Russell mother of Mrs. Nelson D. Armour of this City reported in yesterday's Guardian.—Mrs. William Russell, who lives at Lakeville, parish of Moncton, near Pausac Junction, was terribly burned while alone at her home Tuesday afternoon. She made a fire in the yard, to burn some old rubbish, and in some unexplained manner her clothing caught fire, and she was terribly burned from her waist to her ankles. Her hands were also severely burned by the frantic woman in trying to tear the clothing off herself. After her clothes caught fire Mrs. Russell drew three buckets of water from the well and threw over herself, the clothes being ablaze all the while, her flesh below the waist being burned to a crisp. Mrs. Russell's husband and grandson, who live with her, were away at the time working on the railway track. The house is some distance from any other in the locality and Mrs. Russell's misfortune was unnoticed by any of the neighbors. After the clothes had been practically burned off her, she managed to crawl to the house and proceed upstairs to get something with which to cover her self. Finally some of the neighbors heard her screams and ran to her assistance. Dr. White was hastily summoned from Moncton and did everything possible to relieve her suffering but no hopes are entertained of her recovery. As may be seen by The Guardian's despatches today Mrs. Russell has since died. The Guardian extends its sympathy to Mrs. Armour and her family.

**FASTERN NOTES.**—Though October was one of the severest on record, November is turning out very fine with the roads comparatively good.—A comparison of this year with some fifteen years ago or even later reveals a wonderful transformation and a favorable one in farmers methods. All that period for days in succession, trucks, carts and truck waggons followed each other in regular rotation cutting up the roads and digging the ruts deeper laden with oats and potatoes as well as the potash and other valuable constituents of the soil which were stored up and prepared for men's advantage acres before the keel of Columbus furrowed the western Atlantic. But few loads of produce are now seen on our roads, the farmer saves his day besides the wear and tare on horses and harness to say nothing of an occasional glass of whiskey with its after effects against which at least some of the sons of the east are no more proof than the sons of the Province. While some of our farmers received more money in one day from the much talked of Dominion Packing Company than they would in a week's hauling of produce. But few fall codfish have been taken so far on the north side as they are scarce, and the haved dog-fish are still here. Two firms McDonald & LaPiere, and Fraser & Stewart have moved up to West River for the fall as bait is easier got there and fish are generally plentier the closer you get to East Point. There are abundance of squid just now.—Dr. McInnis is still on the sick list, he is fortunate in securing the services of Theodore Fraser to nurse him. Theodore got home from Bird Rocks recently.—Red Point cheese factory closed on the 5th inst.
