MOTHERS HIT AT POLYGAMY

WASHINGTON, May 2—Declaring that wherever the Mormon organization controls the church is in indisputed possession of all political power, contrary to the federal constitution, the National Congress of Mothers, at its closing session tonight, adopted resolutions urging congressional legislation to eliminate polygamy, recommending a constitutional amendment giving federal jurisdiction over the crime of polygamy and protesting against the acceptance by the battleship Utah of the silver service bearing the representation of Brigham Young.

Mrs. Frederick Schoff of Philadelphia today was unanimously re-elected president of the National Congress of Mothers, which adjourned tonight. Mrs. David O. Mears of Albany, N. Y., was unanimously chosen national vice-president. Other officers elected were: Recording secretary, Mrs. Jas. S. Bulton, New Haven, Conn.; treasurer, Mrs. W. B. Ferguson, Connecticut; auditor, Mrs. William T. Thatcher, Florence, N. J.; historian, Mrs. C. A. Tuttle, New York city.

One locomotive was disabled near Shediac, and another locomotive, sent to take its place, ran off the track at the Point with the result that the passengers did not arrive in Moncton until six o'clock p. m. Many of them remained in Moncton until yesterday.—Transcript.

The Edmonton correspondent of the Moncton Times writes: Prof. W. H. Watts, formerly organist in St. John's Presbyterian church, Moncton, is in Edmonton. Since coming to the western town the Professor has made a name for himself in the music world and is the organist in the First Presbyterian, which is one of the largest churches in Edmonton. Mr. Watts will be well remembered by many Monctonians, particularly those of St. John's congregation, as he presided at the organ in that church for two years. Previous to coming here Prof. Watts was in Charlottetown.

This week the buoys outside the harbor were placed. All buoys are in this year in splendid condition, having been cleaned and carefully attended to. This year some changes will be made in the placing of the buoys. The mid-strait buoy and automatic buoy will be moved to West Point and the automatic buoy there is to be placed off North Cape reef. A large black can buoy will be placed on the end of the Miscouche shoal which will undoubtedly prove a great aid to navigation in that locality. A new buoy will be placed off Zepherus Rock. This will be of a different type than the former gas buoy. The larger buoys will be put out when the Aberdeen arrives from Halifax.

Some days in winter she has had to shovel out snowdrifts ten feet deep to get through. She has been through terrific thunder storms. When she first started to work for the government Miss Markham received \$9 a month, now she gets \$25 monthly.

ENDOWS "SPOOK" UNIVERSITY CHAIR

SAN FRANCISCO, May 2—Announcement is made of a gift of \$100,000 to Stanford University by Thomas Weldon Stanford, brother of the late Senator Stanford, half of which is to be used in investigating psychic phenomena. So far no definite decision has been reached by the trustees of Mr. Stanford for the scope of the investigation.

Mr. Stanford is said to have assured the trustees of the university that he is ready to supply as much as \$1,000,000 for the investigation of spiritualism and kindred subjects. He has reached this decision, he says, because he believes that the most certain way to find out the truth is to interest learned persons in the subject and let them conduct impartial investigations under conditions that will exclude impostors.
