INCREASE IN POTATO CROP—
 Canada will produce 45,262,000 hundred-weight of potatoes this year according to a forecast made by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. Last year Canada's crop was 39,930,000 cwt. The statement by provinces this year with last year's crop in brackets follows: Prince Edward Island, 4,652,000 cwt. (3,820,000); Nova Scotia, 3,164,000 (2,872,000); New Brunswick, 5,179,000 (4,646,000); Quebec, 4,314,000; Ontario, 9,524,000 (8,484,000); Manitoba, 2,355,000 (1,161,000); Saskatchewan, 2,845,000 (1,149,000); Alberta, 1,802,000 (1,922,000); British Columbia, 1,427,000 (1,347,000).

A resolution to the effect that the bid of Wood, Gundy & Co., Montreal of 102.25 for the purchase of \$32,500 of bonds be accepted, was adopted.

A representative from the company from which the new fire apparatus will be purchased explained the terms of sale, and answered questions put to him by the councillors and seconded by Councillor Holman that the report of the fire committee be adopted. An amendment to the motion was moved by Councillor Foster and seconded by Councillor Burke that the report be held over for a special meeting for reconsideration. The original resolution was adopted.

The following report was read by Councillor Holman, Chairman of Police Committee:—

The undersigned has the honor to submit herewith the City Police Report for the month ended September 30, 1930.

In addition to the above mentioned arrests there were thirty-two prosecutions entered under the City Traffic By-Law for "Speeding," resulting in twenty six convictions and six dismissals. There were also six convictions for operating motor vehicles without license, one for neglecting to stop after an accident, one for Breach of the Customs Act, two for Disorderly Conduct, one for operating a restaurant without license two for common assault, one for assault on peace officer, three for breach of the Sanitary By-Law and two for non-payment of dog tax.

We assisted the Prohibition Officers in fourteen searches of premises suspected of the unlawful sale or possession of intoxicating liquor. Eleven prosecutions were entered, resulting in seven convictions and four dismissals.

On September 18th the Force collected twenty-eight samples of milk from Licensed Milk Vendors and delivered same to the City Analyst for Test.
