ITALIAN TROOPS ADVANCE TO AKSUM

ASSEMBLY MEETS TODAY TO CONSIDER SANCTIONS

SON BORN TO DUCHESSES OF KENT

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire)
LONDON, Oct. 9.—(Wednesday)—A son, the seventh in line of succession to the British throne, was born early today to the Duchess of Kent.

An official announcement said the birth occurred at 2:15 a. m., and the glad news was telephoned at once to Sandringham Lodge, Norfolk, where the King and Queen are in residence.

The proud father, youngest son of Their Majesties, had waited all night with his parents-in-law, Prince and Princess Nicolas of Greece, at No. three Belgrave Square.

Both the mother, the former Princess Marina of Greece and her royal son were doing well, it was learned.

The Duke of Gloucester and his fiancée, Lady Alice Montagu-Douglas-Scott, heard the tidings at Sandringham, and the Prince of Wales and other members of the Royal Family immediately were informed.

The Home Secretary, Sir John Simon, was present at the birth of the Royal baby, as is required by constitutional procedure. A half hour after the baby was born, a fast car sped out Belgrave Square, bearing official bulletins which were posted publicly at the Home Office.

The Duke and Duchess returned to Britain early in September after a prolonged summer holiday in Yugoslavia.

Ahead of the new member of the Royal house in line of succession to the Throne are the Prince of Wales, the Duke of York, his daughters the Princesses Elizabeth and Margaret, the Duke of Gloucester and the Duke of Kent.

McLure And Myers Invade Fortress Of Liberal Party

Harrington Hall Filled At Enthusiastic Conservative Meeting Last Night.

Italy's invasion of Abyssinia had nothing on the striking achievement last night of Messrs. W. Chester S. McLure and John H. Myers, Queens County Conservative standard-bearers, who addressed a crowded meeting at Harrington, one of the supposedly strongest Liberal fortresses in the Province, and received an enthusiastic welcome.

It was a signal demonstration of the rising tide of popular approval of the Bennett policies and of the record of the Conservative candidates during their past five years of strenuous service in Parliament.

Particularly noticeable was the keen interest and appreciation of the audience in the reference made to Canada's outstanding success under the Empire trade policies of the Bennett Government. This issue, emphasized so strongly by the Prime Minister himself in his Charlottetown address, was dealt with effectively by both speakers.

Mr. Bert Brown capably presided at the meeting which filled the hall and at which the best of good order prevailed.

MR. MYERS

"At long range our opponents tell us that we are afraid to meet them on the platform," said Mr. Myers, the first speaker. "The decision to discontinue joint meetings, as other provinces have done years ago, was taken out of consideration for the electors, as well as the candidates of whom there are six in this County. We are not afraid of our opponents on the platform or anywhere else; and we are not afraid of them on the 14th." (Applause).

Mr. Myers dealt with Canada's predicament

Demanding that the public should be given the information as to whether or not \$100,000 had been given to the banks for the Potato Growers' Association, Dr. MacMillan emphasized the serious position in which some members of the government had placed themselves.

A largely attended meeting at Georgetown gave the Candidates and special speakers a very attentive hearing. Mayor James J. Donnan presided.

Farmers' Costs Reduced, Farm Prices Increased, Under Bennett Gov't.

Much has been heard from Liberal politicians that if they are returned to power on October 14, the duties on farm machinery will be lowered, which, they claim, would be of great value to the Canadian farmer. The following survey of prices of comparative machinery at present and the results are interesting. It is shown that in practically every case, the Canadian farmer buys machinery cheaper than does the American farmer. Here are some typical comparisons:

ROME, Oct. 8.—Signora Baratterio Conzatti, aged 90, sister of General Baratterio, who in 1896 commanded the "Lost Legion" that was fighting at Adowa, today telegraphed her gratitude to Premier Mussolini for the avenging of the Italian defeat.

"My 40 years of painful waiting and watching are at an end," she wired. "My brother and his valiant comrades are avenged."

Il Duce Prepares Defences As League Sanctions Loom; Envoy Is Handed Passport

Ethiopians Urged To Evacuate Eritrea. FEAR AIR RAIDS

DEFEATS ON TIGREAN FRONT REMAIN UNCONFIRMED.

ADDIS ABABA, Oct. 8.—Emperor Haile Selassie, heartened by the prospect of League of Nations sanctions against Italy, urged all Ethiopians to evacuate the Italian colony of Eritrea tonight and told his envoy to Rome to ask for his passports.

The Negus was represented by his aides as believing major sanctions will break down Italy's defiance while the armies of Il Duce are halted by the rock-ribbed mountain citadels of Ethiopia, which no invader yet has penetrated.

He was confident, too, of the unbroken morale of his own savage warriors, reported massed by the thousands in the Italian lines in northern Ethiopia.

The Emperor ordered Nagadras Yesus, his Minister to Rome, to ask for his passports; told the Ethiopian Consul at Asmara, Eritrea, to withdraw, and asked all Ethiopians to leave Eritrea.

Handed Passport

(The League of Nations also was informed in an Ethiopian note that Luigi Vinciguerra, Italian Minister to Addis Ababa, had been handed his passport.)

Then Selassie proclaimed that since all Italians were leaving his nation, the remaining Europeans must be considered friends and treated accordingly.

As for peace, the Emperor was asked if he would accept French mediation to settle his dispute with Italy. His answer was "no".

Lights were ordered extinguished nightly in Addis Ababa as the Emperor took precautions against air raids. Inhabitants were ordered to draw their curtains, evacuate the streets, and to refrain from using flashlights. Traffic was ordered suspended after dark.

Calmly, the Emperor waited the decision of the League Assembly on sanctions. He was fortified by the Council's action in indicating Italy as a violator of the Covenant.

Diplomatic Negotiations Resumed

(By Guardian's Special Wire)
LONDON, Oct. 8.—Further diplomatic exchanges between Britain and France will probably take place, it was learned authoritatively tonight following the reply from Paris to a government note. This note sought to know if Britain could count on French assistance, in the event of an isolated attack upon her while preparing for imposition of sanctions.

Apparently the reply was not so clearcut as the foreign office would have liked, as it was not strictly linked to the possible early contingency which Britain had in mind.

The French answer said France was ready to assist Britain in such a case by land, sea and air providing Britain would do likewise for France. The answer also specifically included a possible attack by a non-member of the League of Nations.

In the British view this point carries the matter to a new plane. The next stage probably will be a British questionnaire to France.

Begin Work On Sanctions

First Phase Of Offensive Is Completed. WAR MEASURES

MUSSOLINI PRESSES PREPARATIONS AT HOME.

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire)
ROME, Oct. 9.—(Wednesday)—Dispatches from Italian correspondents at Asmara early today said a strong column of the second army corps left Adowa yesterday in the direction of Aksum, and was last reported 15 kilometres (about nine miles) from that objective.

The correspondents indicated to their editors that by the time the dispatches reached Rome Aksum, Holy City of Ethiopia, would be taken. (Aksum lies due almost west of Adowa, about 20 miles distant.)

Other Asmara dispatches printed by morning papers said workmen building roads near the border of Eritrea and Ethiopia had been attacked by strong forces of natives. The workmen were armed, however, and drove off their assailants, killing 20 and wounding numerous others, the dispatches stated.

Army headquarters at Adowa reported, according to the dispatches, that an Ethiopian monoplane had been sighted south of Adowa, but disappeared when an Italian squadron from Asmara flew in pursuit.

More Troops for Africa

Premier Mussolini went determinedly ahead with war measures at home today while the League of Nations prepared sanctions against him.

Five vessels sailed from Naples bearing 2,000 more soldiers and cargoes of munitions for the Italian forces in East Africa.

Il Duce, after a review of the 10,000 officers of the nation's 1-200,000 young Fascists, who soon will be in the army, told them they must: "temper your souls like steel."

During the review there were loosed beside Mussolini great flocks of doves symbolic of peace.

Reports from the front said officers were restraining the eagerness of troops to advance farther into Ethiopia. Artillery fire, however, was used to drive Ethiopians
