FAMOUS CHARACTER ACTOR FRANK BACON, IS NO MORE

CHICAGO, Nov. 24.—The entire theatrical world today mourned the passing of Frank Bacon, famous character actor, who delighted thousands in "Lightnin'." Bacon died at a Chicago hotel as a result of heart trouble and overwork. He gave up the leading role in "Lightnin'" on November 13 after appearing in more than 2,000 performances. Memorial services were held at the Blackstone Theatre. Judge K. M. Landis delivered the eulogy and services were held under the auspices of the Christian Science church, of which he was a member.

DOWNFALL OF ROME FINELY PICTURED

Cecil B. DeMille Presents Historic Scene in "Manslaughter" at the Prince Edward Next Wednesday and Thursday.

There was no photographer to record the dress and customs of the day when the barbarians overthrew ancient Rome. Nevertheless Cecil B. DeMille has produced an historically faithful reproduction of this for his latest Paramount picture "Manslaughter," coming to the Prince Edward Theatre Wednesday and Thursday next. The episode in question is a historical cutback, which vividly depicts the descent of the barbarian hordes upon Rome. Weeks of research work on the part of the director, scenarist, and art director, proceeded the filming of the scenes. Laatrice Joy, who is one of the principals of the modern portion of the story, is the hostess at a lavish beautiful Roman bacchanal which is interrupted by Thomas Meighan in the role of the leader of the Goths. Lois Wilson, John Miller and Casson Ferguson are the other members of the notable cast who appear in this sequence. A strikingly realistic gladiatorial combat is one of the most interesting features of the bacchanalian entertainment. Although this episode required more than a week to film and kept nearly a thousand people employed, it will occupy the screen for only a few minutes. It is used to point a powerful lesson and serves to draw an interesting comparison between ancient Rome and modern America.

OLDEST EAR CORN IN EXISTENCE.

MINNESOTA CITY, Mont., Nov. 23.—What is believed to be the oldest ear of corn extant in the United States, and the most ancient to be sent among the many modern ears in the Montana state corn show, was placed on exhibition in the auditorium by Lee Bennett of Moon Creek. The ear is 133 years of age and was undoubtedly raised on Manhattan Island before the Indians discovered themselves entirely of all the land and was taken to Halifax, Nova Scotia, in 1789 by Captain Parker of the English navy. The record accompanying the ear is in the possession of Mr. Bennett. His great-grandfather as was the custom of the times in those days, kept a diary and in it was recorded the receipt of the ear. It reads as follows: "Halifax, Nova Scotia, On 24 June 1789 Received this ear of Indian corn this day from Capt. Parker of Shelburne, just arrived from New York. (Signed) Michael Bennett." This ancient relic of the agricultural activities of the early primitive inhabitants consists of the cob and a few kernels of corn still clinging to it. Most of the kernels have been removed by curious seekers who have taken one or more to keep. It will occupy a prominent place in the Montana state corn show and enclosed in glass will constitute an antique exhibit as the oldest ear of corn in the United States. Michael Bennett is a great-grandfather of the Bennett Brothers of Moon Creek. His son Edward Michael, born in 1804 migrated to Iowa in the early fifties and is believed to have been the original and pioneer raiser in the western part of the Hawkeye state. In like manner the idea of raising and becoming proficient in the culture of corn has descended in the Bennett family and a branch of the Bennett family, in Montana, engaged in the same pursuit. Authorities investigating the mysterious deaths of Irving Henderson, his wife and their four small children, whose bodies were found scattered about their home shortly before noon, tonight received their first tangible clue. Dr. R. W. Mondhank, local physician, announced that Henderson had consulted with him on Friday and several times since over a mysterious malady which had affected members of his family, and had told him that he believed he was being given poison. Henderson, who was employed as a stationary engineer in Pennsylvania Railroad shops in a shop where a shopmen's strike is unsettled, said he believed he was being poisoned by those who resented his accepting employment at the shops. Dr. Mondhank said, Henderson gave him the name of a man he suspected, the physician cleared, and this was turned over to the authorities, without being made public.
