**BROOKLINE, Mass., Feb. 1**—Funeral services for Mrs. Muriel Wedlock Ackerman, 41 Brook street, this town, a native of Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, were held from her late residence Friday, Jan. 30th afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Mrs. Ackerman, who was 22 years of age died at the St. Elizabeth Hospital in Brighton on Thursday afternoon, following the birth of a daughter, two days previous. She had made her home with her family in this town for the past four years and was popular among the younger set of the town.

Surviving her are her husband, William Glenn Ackerman, Pittsburgh, Penn., and Boston business man; a 14-month-old daughter, Muriel; the newly-born daughter, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. A. Wedlock; two brothers, Keith, a sophomore at Harvard University; and Roy, and a sister, Miss Wanda M. E. Wedlock.

At a meeting of the Board of Trade Council Saturday afternoon a communication from Mr. W. U. Appleton, General Manager of the Atlantic Region of the C. N. R., relative to the Hillsboro Bridge was discussed. The communication stated that the railway is arranging to provide suitable equipment for traffic on the bridge. The new branch line at Pisiquid, it is explained, had been constructed to avoid the necessity of shortening the span.

Mr. R. H. Jenkins maintained that the latter statement was incorrect. A number of the other members expressed the same opinion.

The secretary was instructed to reply to Mr. Appleton's letter taking exception to the statement, as being contrary to the understanding when the Pisiquid branch was first constructed. The matter of negotiating for improved service was left to the Transportation Committee.

A letter was read from the Summerside Board of Trade relative to the report that the new car ferry would be delayed in entering service.

Mr. R. H. Jenkins stated he had information that the ferry would be in service on July 1.

It was decided to loan the picture of Queen Victoria and the Prince Consort, which are hanging in the Board of Trade rooms for use in the Confederation Chamber.

Communications were read from farmers' organizations respecting a resolution passed by the Winnipeg Board of Trade advocating a national policy for the development of the live stock industry. No consideration had been given this resolution by the Dairyman's Association or the Sheep Breeders' Association. Approval was expressed by the Prince Edward Island Egg and Poultry Association.

A communication from Mr. J. J. Leitch respecting a resolution passed by the Canadian Produce Association advocating regularity in dimensions and weight of egg cases, was also read and left till the next quarterly meeting for consideration.

Caught by the neck between a belt and a pulley in Coles' sawmill at Milton, Forden Judson, 23 years of age, a native of Alexandria, met his death yesterday morning. The tragic accident occurred about 9 o'clock when the unfortunate man was alone in the mill. Mystery surrounds the particulars and cause of the accident. Doctors who examined the body state that death was due to strangulation.

When the body was found Dr. Murchison of Clyde River was notified. After examining the body and concluding that life was extinct, Dr. Murchison notified the coroner. Dr. Houston ordered the body to be removed to McLean's Undertaking Parlor. As the death was obviously accidental, it was decided that an inquest was unnecessary.

Mr. Judson was a stepson of Mr. H. A. Robertson, 167 Dorchester Street. The deceased is survived by two brothers, Bruce and Athol Judson, Alexandria.

Five applications of returned soldiers were heard yesterday morning at the first session of the Pensions Tribunal which is sitting in the Provincial Building.

The Tribunal is hearing cases from all over the province numbering twenty two. Five of those will be heard daily until Friday, when the two that remain will be up for disposal. On Saturday the members of the Tribunal leave for Newcastle, New Brunswick, from whence they proceed to Quebec City.

Members of the Tribunal are Col. L. H. MacKenzie, Col. N. P. MacLeod, Capt. J. A. W. LaBelle is Registrar. Dr. Kenneth Cameron is acting in the capacity of medical adviser.

Presenting the cases for Island veterans is Mr. N. W. Lowther, Pensions Advocate for the district. Acting as counsel for the Pension Commission are Messrs B. A. Bridges and A. LaBelle.

All hearings are open to the public unless the applicant for personal reasons, desires otherwise. Several cases were heard this morning.

The claimants, witnesses and interested relatives of returned men made up a sizeable gallery of spectators as the Tribunal opened its deliberations.

When decisions are made these are not divulged publicly, the applicant being notified from Ottawa at a later date.

**SUPREME COURT**—At the Supreme Court yesterday the case of Rev. Dr. Genge vs. Monteith R. Hardy, came up before Mr. Justice Saunders and a jury. The plaintiff has taken action against the defendant for \$285 damages alleged to have been caused as the result of an automobile collision on August 5th. The plaintiff claims that on that date the defendant so negligently managed and drove his motor car that he drove it with great force against the plaintiff's car causing the latter to come into collision with Utey's Birt's car, doing additional damage to the plaintiff's car. It is charged that the plaintiff was on the wrong side of the road and let his motor car out of control. J. J. Johnston is counsel for the plaintiff, and Reginald Bell and George J. Tweedy are the defendant. Six witnesses were examined for the plaintiff, Rev. Morgan E. Genge, Mrs. Genge, Messrs Wm. Waits, John McParlane, Leith Brown, Noble Campbell, Mr. G. J. Tweedy opened the case for the defense and called the first witness, the defendant, Mr. Monteith Hardy. The witness was under cross examination when the court adjourned.
