EDMONTON, Alb., Jan. 28.—The most daring bank robbery in the history of this city was pulled off at half past twelve this morning in the most thickly populated part of the city. Two unknown masked men carrying a coil of rope, entered the bank of Nova Scotia and at the point of the gun demanded of the only person in the building, a ledger keeper, named Clarence West, that he throw up his hands. West refused to comply and a desperate struggle ensued, while many late pedestrians passed by totally unaware of what was going on inside the bank. Eventually the robbers managed to bind West and hurriedly proceeded to the outer safe which they rifled of a hundred dollars. 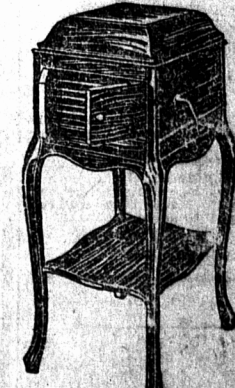
