We understand the latter have asked for a game and the local team has been practicing in the evenings with the hope that such a meeting may be pulled off but as yet they have no assurance that the game will be scheduled.—New Glasgow Chronicle.

Mr. Justice Fitzgerald has given a decision in the suit for the administration of the estate of the late Ann Connolly, widow of the late Owen Connolly, Charlottetown. He decided that "under the evidence the deed to Bridget Coady must be held to convey the property therein described, and consequently direct that it is not to be considered an asset in the administration of Mrs. Connolly's estate. There was also a suggestion that the testatrix stood in loco parentis to her sister Mrs. Coady. There is no evidence to support such contention. On receiving the report of the Master to whom the accounts of the estate were referred, a final order in administration will be made in pursuance of this Judgment."
