Referring to the icebreaker Stanley, formerly of this port, a Sydney exchange says—The government icebreaker Stanley arrived in port this morning. Her chief aim in coming to Sydney was to break up the ice sufficiently to allow of the Coal Company's steamers to get out. But while here she made several trips up the harbor as far as the R. C. B. Yacht Club. Although in places the ice is almost two feet thick and of a tough, leathery consistency, the Stanley walked through it with as much ease as a pleasure boat glides over the water of the river on a calm summer's day. She is an ice breaker from bow to stern. Her bows are sharp and solid, and heavy in the stem, she rises above the ice and then settles down again, breaking all before her. A large crowd of people congregated along the Esplanade all morning, as it is some years since Sydney has been visited with such a boat. The C. B. Electric Co., when asked by the Post this morning, stated that they did not know whether they would be able to get their boats out from here or not, but thought probably they would. Steam is being kept up in case the ice breaker get far enough in towards the wharf.
