READY FOR BUSINESS—The schooner Glyndon, which wintered in this port has recently been painted and now presents a very attractive appearance. Capt Miller who is in command is busily engaged in taking on a cargo of hay and oats, he intends sailing for Gaspe about Wednesday, and on the return trip will bring a cargo of lumber or railway sleepers. The schooners Annie D., Capt. Gallant and the J. H. Ernest, Capt. Grady are also in readiness and waiting for a favorable wind for Picot where both will load with coal. H.

ALBERTON TOWN COUNCIL.—The regular meeting of the town council was held the night of the 13th inst., in the Council Chamber. A full council was present. Minutes of the last regular and special meetings were read and adopted, several accounts were ordered paid. The petition from residents of the eastern section asking for the installation of an electric light at or near the corner of the W. R. Oulton property was presented and read. The several al committee chairmen brought in reports and the street and sidewalk stated that the sum of about \$250 and \$256 respectively would be required to perform certain outlined work. Pending the arrival of the government engineers and the starting of outlined work by the government it was decided to allow these matters to stand over for the present. The Electric Light Co. submitted proposed changes in the existing contract, which expires on the 15th of November, 1924. These changes were in substance: Power to turn off the lights at 12.30 midnight when the water supply was insufficient to continue same, the company to deduct 10 per cent per hour pro rata for such turning off. The town to pay \$630 per annum for lights (it now pays approximately \$400) now in use. Minimum charge of \$1.25 per month, including rent of meter. These changes were discussed briefly by the Council and a fuller consideration deferred until a future date. Meeting adjourned.

SOCIAL AND CONCERT AT TRAVELLERS REST.—The ladies of New Annan Women's Institute staged a successful concert and basket social at Travellers Rest hall on Friday evening, May 18th. Every number on the musical program was voted enthusiastically. The sum of \$30.00 was realized, which will be used for the benefit of New Annan School. (United Press.) PHILADELPHIA, May 11.—"Come East, young man," as economists have advocated recently is not such good advice as "Stay where you are, young man," according to Dr. Raymond T. Bye, economist at the University of Pennsylvania. The old saying "Go West, young man," has been followed by the advice "Go South," and now it is said that the East abounds with opportunities for the young man. Dr. Bye disagrees with those who advocate moving to different sections.

"Just as many fortunes are made in the East as in the West or South," he says. "People are deluded who think they can go to some particular territory and be a bonanza drop into their laps. Immigrants come here after hearing fabulous tales about the United States, but find they have to settle down to hard work and probably live in a cheap tenement."

The East affords many opportunities to a young man, and the young men here do not have to look further for a place to start their careers. "America is becoming a creditor nation, so that our commercial
