Age of hearing him yesterday will be anxious to hear him as he speaks at the various sessions of the Missionary Institute.

Rev. A. F. Robb, returned Presbyterian minister from Corea was the preacher at Zion Church yesterday morning. He referred to the fact that the Presbyterian Church had been its missionary work in Corea thirty-four years ago and the speaker had been engaged as a missionary here for seventeen years—just half that period. The church in Corea had aid was largely self-supporting and self-propagating. The work being done there was not only evangelical but educational, there being established a large number of schools across the whole Peninsula and extending beyond the border into Manchuria. He spoke of the habits and customs of the people and referred to the practise of child-marriage which happily has been abolished through Christianity. A great more however, remains to be done and the need for laborers in that mission field is still urgent.

Rev. H. D. Priest, Secretary of the Missionary Education Movement of Canada representing all missionary boards of the Protestant churches in Canada was the speaker at the evening service. He dealt with the subject of missions from four standpoints: (1) The lure of the inward life; (2) The lure of the ability to face a great task; (3) The lure of leadership and (4) The lure of sacrifice. On the last point the speaker said the war had taught the value of sacrifice and if the same degree of consecration to Christian missions could be given as was devoted to the winning of the war then the great task of winning the world to Christ would be accomplished.

Rev. Mr. Freeman of the Baptist Church preached in the Methodist Church last evening and Rev. Mr. Fulton preached in the Baptist Church at the morning service both delivering exceptionally able discourses.
