HALIFAX, Jan. 17.—Weather synopsis and official inland forecasts issued by the Dominion Public Weather Office at Halifax at 11:15 p.m. Friday.

Synopsis: The weather is generally clear over Eastern Canada, with temperatures somewhat above normal. Colder air over Central Canada is moving slowly southeast towards the Maritimes, but is expected to only cover New Brunswick by Saturday evening. As this colder air moves over Nova Scotia Sunday snowfalls are expected, with clear weather over Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick.
