Yanks Drop To Last Place Tie As Tigers Hand Out 4-2 Defeat

NEW YORK, May 7.—(AP)—Even Joe DiMaggio couldn't break the jinx of left-hand pitching for New York Yankees and Detroit Tigers took over second place in the American Baseball League, snapping the fourth consecutive defeat on the world champions 4-2 today. The loss dropped the Yankees into a tie for last place.

DiMaggio made an unheralded appearance in the Yankee lineup; limping slightly as he patrolled centerfield for the first time this season. He had wrenched a knee in an exhibition game.

He was installed in the cleanup spot in the champions' batting order, but failed to exercise any magic with his bat. He singled once with the bases empty and fouled out with the bases loaded in the seventh.

Altogether the Yanks got nine hits and six walks, but they never had a chance against young Harold Newhouser, the rookie southpaw pitcher who worked until he started a finger and had to be relieved in the ninth.

At Boston, the timely hitting of Lou Pflanze and Gene DeSauteles was more effective than the barbs aimed at the veteran Bob Grove as the Red Sox strengthened their grip on first place by defeating Cleveland Indians 6-4. The loss dropped the Indians into third place.

Cleveland outdid the Sox, 13-8 in the series' final. All but one of the hits were against the venerable

southpaw, who left the mound in the eighth inning after Hal Truesky and Rolly Hemsey homered, and Ken Keltner singled for a three-run rally that was choked off by Rookie Herb Hash.

Although Grove was hit hard from the start, he kept the Indians scoreless until the eighth.

The Red Sox, however, piled up enough runs to win in the first three innings against Mike Nymack and Johnny Allen.

Five-hit pitching by Jack Knott and Pete Appleton, helped along by four Philadelphia errors, gave Chicago a 6-3 victory over the Athletics at Philadelphia.

Four of the White Sox runs were unearned.

Knott allowed one run and three hits in the first two innings, then tightened up and pitched no-hit ball until the seventh.

Catcher Mike Treib was banished from the Chicago lineup in the seventh for pushing umpire Greise during a dispute over a foul.

Johnny Whitehead's wild pitch with the score tied and the bases loaded in the 10th inning gave the Senators a 6-5 victory over the visiting St. Louis Browns. It was Washington's first triumph in the last six starts.

Gerald Walker and Rookie Sid Hudson figured prominently in the victory. Walker got four hits, one of a double, knocked in two runs, stole a base and scored a run. Hudson scattered 11 hits to get his first victory in the majors.

Dizzy Dean Goes On Reserve Pitchers' List

CHICAGO, May 7.—(AP)—Dizzy Dean is going on reserve.

The pitcher for whom Chicago Cubs of the National Baseball League paid \$185,000 in cash has been relegated to the roll of a reserve moundman. But owner K. Wrigley is not yet ready to pass final judgment on the big right-hander who only six years ago won 30 games as St. Louis won the National League flag and the World Series.

He's willing to give O' Diz at least one more chance before putting a cub "period" to one of the most spectacular, up-and-down, news-making careers baseball ever knew.

"With the record he's made I don't know whom we could trade him to now," said Wrigley of the player who yesterday was knocked out of the box for the third time in four starts this season. "Of course it's a little early to make a decision yet."

Manager Gabby Hartnett announced today that Ken Raffensberger, 22-year-old southpaw, would start tomorrow's game against Brooklyn. Raffensberger, taking over Dean's spot among the starters, has allowed two runs and nine hits in 11 innings of relief work.

The word immediately got around town that Dizzy had left the Cubs and returned to his Texas farm, but the club denied this report.

Nate Bain Manager Of Gateways

YARMOUTH, N. S., May 6.—(CP)—Nate Bain, for 12 years a mainstay of the mound staff of Yarmouth Gateways, was picked tonight as manager of the Western Counties Baseball League squad.

The big right-hander, who has hurried for the Gateways in everythang from exhibition fixture, to the Maritime playoffs, has also been named coach of Yarmouth Academy's ball squad, 1939 high school champions.

Bain said tonight the 1940 edition of the Gateways will be about the same as last year.

Cards Take Revenge For Defeats By Smothering Dodgers With 18-2 Score

NEW YORK, May 7.—(AP)—The St. Louis Cardinals revented themselves on Brooklyn Dodgers today with a record collection of seven home runs and 49 total bases out of 20 hits—proving by an 18-2 verdict that the National Baseball League leaders can be stopped. The game was at St. Louis.

The Redbirds kept up such a steady bombardment that Manager Leo Durocher of the Dodgers took cover in the middle of the game, letting Peeewe Reese substitute at shortstop, and kept Hutch Casey on the mound for seven innings to save wear and tear on his other pitchers.

Don Paget started the uprising in the second inning with a round tripper. Rookie infielder Eddie Lake followed with one in the third and another with one on in the eighth. Johnny Mize hit for the circuit, also in the third with one on and again in the eighth. Stu Martin joined in the shooting with one in the fourth and Joe Medwick hit one in the sixth with one on.

Behind this powerful offensive lean Lonnie Warneke pitched shut-out ball for seven innings and weakly only in the eighth when the Dodgers got four of their nine hits and both their runs. The seven homers hit by the Cards tied a National League peak reached five times in the past. The Yankees set the major league high of eight in the American League last year.

The 49 total bases on seven homers, two triples, four doubles and seven singles bettered the modern National League mark of 47 set by New York Giants in 1931, but also was four short of the Yanks' major league level of last year.

It was the second defeat in 13 games for Brooklyn—the previous setback being a decisive 9-2 loss to Cincinnati.

Harry Danning got two home runs

and a single to drive in four of the New York Giants' runs, but he had to be the goat of a 7-6 victory by the Reds at Cincinnati.

It was the fifth straight triumph for the champions and the fourth consecutive loss for the Giants dropping them into a tie with Boston for fifth place.

Trailing by one run in the eighth after Danning had homered with two on in the first half of the inning, the Reds tied the score when the big catcher dropped the ball on a double steal.

Eight pitchers took part in the melee.

Like Pearson, 28-year-old right-hander, shut out the Cubs with a four-hitter to give Philadelphia Phillies a 1-0 victory at Chicago. The triumph raised the Phillies into fourth place.

An error by catcher Al Todd produced the game's lone run. Ben Warren beat out an infield hit in the fifth, went to second on a base on ball and reached third in a double play. He scored when a third strike on Pearson crowned off Todd's eye and rolled several feet.

With Eddie Miller furnishing the big punch, the revamped Boston Bees stammered 16 hits off four starters to hand the Pirates their seventh straight defeat 11-9 in a game at Pittsburgh.

The flashy Boston shortstop knocked in four runs, three on a fifth inning homer.

Mt'l. Snaps Losing Streak To Rout Newark Bears 13-0

MONTREAL, May 7.—(CP)—Behind Kemp Wicker's airtight pitching, Montreal Royals hammered out 15 hits good for 28 bases today to rout Newark Bears 13-0 in the third game of a three-game International Baseball League losing streak.

Home runs by Lindsey Deal, Sammy Bell and Tuck Starnback and four two-baggers were included in the Montreal attack on three Newark right-handers, Hank Borow, Marcus Beddingfield and the veteran major leaguer, Fred Frankhouse.

Wicker, southpaw star of the Royals, remained unbeaten this year scoring his fourth win of the season and running his streak of scoreless innings to 23 with his second straight shutout.

A pinch-slug by Rene Montegardo drove in Jim Vernon and Dusty Cooke with the eighth-inning runs that gave Jersey City a 3-2 triumph over Toronto Maple Leafs at Toronto. Montegardo's drive came off John Bery who replaced Walker Lanfranconi when Vernon walked and Cooke doubled with one out.

Vernon and Cooke manufactured the first Jersey run, the first sack-

er clouting a double and scoring on Cooke's one-bagger.

John Tyier returned to the Toronto lineup and drove in both runs of the home stretch. He led off the third with a home run, and came through with a single in the fourth to score Lodigiani, who had singled.

Harry Davis clouted a home run with the bases loaded in the sixth inning to give Rochester Red Wings their fifth straight home victory and their third in a row from Baltimore Orioles 10-4. The triumph boosted the Red Wings into third place.

Davis and Lane Blakely got three hits apiece to power the Wings' 13-blow assault on Italo Chelini, Ken Trinkle and Charlie Lauenstein.

At Buffalo, Quinn Lee held Syracuse to six scattered hits to give the Bisons a 4-2 victory, their third straight over the Chiefs.

The Bisons bunched all their runs in the second inning with Les Fleming hitting a circuit clout to start off the rally.

Ara Jones then relieved Pep Rambert on the mound in the third and held Buffalo hitless for the next six innings.
