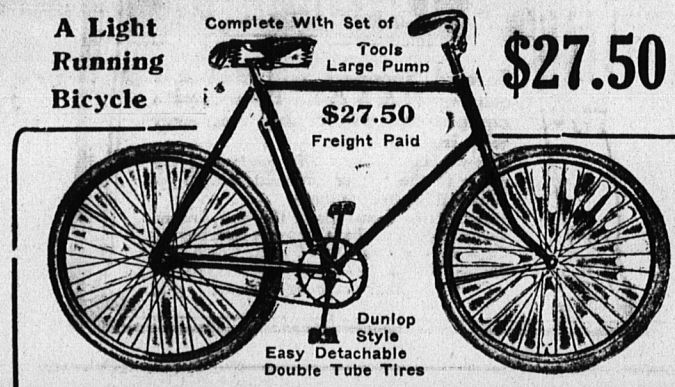

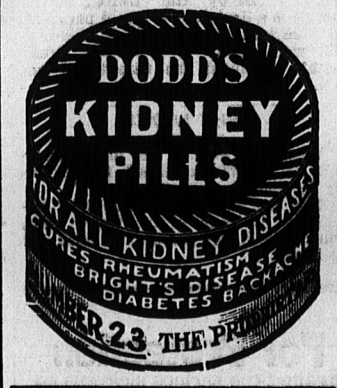

## GERMAN OFFICERS SHOOT OWN TROOPERS

**Panic Stricken Turks at Dardanelles Shot Down by Allied Officers.**  
Turkish patriotism, as evidenced when the Allies invested the historic plains of Troy, appeared to be quite a negligible quantity, resulting in a panic among German officers in the rear to prevent the Ottomans from precipitately fleeing. Such tactics are a true appraisal of the worth of Germany's janissaries, who, without their well-nigh impregnable forts on the Dardanelles, would hardly be foemen worthy of British steel.

The assault of April 29 upon this romantic, historical waterway, the vital place in the German-Turkish armour, goes down in history as the longest naval engagement the world has yet known, lasting from midday Saturday and still proceeding with vigour the following Wednesday afternoon, when more than 8,000 Turks and Germans had been made prisoners by the Allies' land force, and the forts in the Narrows reduced, with the fleet of the Allies still forcing their flaming dagger ahead with persistent progress toward Kum Kale.

Two were victory enough for one day, this progress up which has been persistently declared by the world's foremost naval authorities as an absolutely impregnable naval passage, both shores bristling with fortifications, subjecting the invading ship to a murderous cross fire at all times. Such achievement by our arms fills every patriotic breast with the desire to celebrate, and the most fitting manner for Canadians to show their enthusiasm is to decorate the house with the Union Jack, the same battle flag as led the Allied fleets' battle of the Dardanelles.

No one can afford to be without a flag for the Guardian has made it possible, as announced on another page of to-day's issue, for every reader to have a handsome, fast colour bunting Union Jack, complete with brass-ferrule jointed pole, ball and halyard, together with window socket, on practically gift terms. **GAS POISON LONG READY.**  
LONDON, Tuesday, June 15.—The Morning Post says this morning: "A letter received in Loanhead, Midlothian, by friends of a corporal serving in the Canadian contingent, states that his company, on capturing one of the enemy's trenches, found eight reservoirs of poisonous gas marked 1914, and also respirators dated 1911. This discovery would seem to indicate that the plan of using poison gas was no new thing with the German army, as has been generally understood to be the case. The first recorded case of extensive use by the Germans of gas against the foe was north of Ypres on April 23, when the French lines were driven back two or three miles after a cloud of gas was wafted into their trenches from the German front. Several days before that, the accusation was made by Germans that the British had employed this method of warfare, which was forbidden by The Hague Convention. In London it was assumed that this charge was made simply to serve as a basis for the violation of the same rule by the Kaiser's troops."

## A MOTHER'S LETTER TO BEREAVED ISLAND LADY

The enclosed letter has been received by Mrs. Isabel McDonald from an English Lady in Liverpool who gives some particulars of the death and burial of John W. McDonald who died of wounds received in France. He was brought to Liverpool Military Hospital, May 25th and died the following day.  
Dear Mrs. McDonald:— I am a stranger to you, but I thought you would like to know that an English mother was able to follow your dear son to his last resting place. A stranger in a strange land, but they told us at the hospital how he hadn't a friend in England, and my heart bled for all his friends far away. I am so sorry I was not able to see him. His time was so short there, only two days I think. But I did the little remaining in my power and that was to follow him to the grave and place a few white flowers on his coffin. He had a Military funeral and his coffin was brought to the cemetery covered with the Union Jack, his cap and belt, a volley was fired and the last Post sounded and so we laid him to rest. It will perhaps comfort you a little to know just this much that I am able to tell you. The case was brought to my notice as I visit the Hospital twice a week and having a son myself with the Canadians I find out all I can and visit them in particular but unfortunately your son was brought in between two visiting days but am certain all possible would be done for him as they lose very few cases there and the nurses and Doctors are most kind. The cemetery is close here and as I have a grave there I often go and shall always pass your son's grave. It is a very sad world just now and we are giving of our Best for life and liberty and we mothers cannot but feel for another. God Bless you and yours and comfort you in your trouble is the sincere wish of

## HEAVY FIGHTING IN BELGIUM AND FRANCE

LONDON, June 16.—For the first time in three weeks there has been heavy fighting over an extensive line of the British front in Belgium and France. Berlin makes note of it and describes it as an Anglo-French movement synchronizing with the Russian Reverse in Galicia. To win a mile of front and then lose it before terrible German counter attacks was the experience of British troops Tuesday night. Field Marshal French records the incident but does not state the losses which must have been heavy on both sides. The Germans concede a loss of ground near Ypres but they make no mention of having been forced even temporarily to yield a mile of their front to the British.  
In the East the Austro-Germans advanced a continuous swing forward with the exception of the section between the Dniester Marshes and Zurewna where the Russians are holding the bridge heads and are making headway. General Von Mackensen

has given himself a fortnight to capture Lemberg. This time limit will be ample if the Russians are unable to intimidate stiffer resistance than they show now. The latest Zeppelin raid on England hardly created excitement. Air craft protection was discussed today in the House of Commons. It is thought London must soon expect serious aid raid and it is

added that at one time more that five Zeppelins of the latest type were over England coast. Under Secretary for War H. J. Tennant, besides giving assurance that bigger aeroplanes were under construction said that since the beginning of the war the number of machines has been increased ten fold and the number of men engaged in this branch five fold.
