McDIARMID & McCRADY SINGLES WINNERS

Brilliant Tennis Is Witnessed As Island Open Tournament Closes

Don McDiarmid of Ottawa, this year's Dominion tennis champion on Saturday added another title to his laurels when he captured the Island Open tennis singles championship...

A new ladies singles champion in the person of comely Helen McCraday of Montreal appeared on the horizon also as the Montreal lass took a straight set victory from Jean Wright of Petite Riviere, N.S. in one of the most sensational hard-driving struggles ever witnessed here in a ladies singles match.

Miss Wright Fights Hard

In the first eight games of the match the two finalists battled on even terms to wind up tied at 4-all. Here McCraday took the lead as she held her own service and then won the match and title by breaking through her opponent's service in the 10th game.

It appeared as if the match were all sewed up as McCraday held her own service in the first game of the second set and then broke through her opponent's service to take the second; but here Miss Wright, showing admirable courage and fighting ability rallied to outvie Miss McCraday and take the next three games in a row and a 3-2 lead. But the new champion took control in the sixth game and ran out the match with four straight games to her credit Wright driving out of bounds for the final point of the match as the last game went to deuce three times.

McDiarmid Figures In Three Titles

McDiarmid in addition to winning the singles title figured in two additional championships by pairing with Bob Watt to win the men's doubles and teaming up with Mrs. G. Lewis of Ottawa to take the mixed doubles crown in the last match of the tournament. The men's doubles, although won in straight sets by scores of 6-2, 6-4 and 6-2 produced the best tennis of the day with Hugh Little and C. L. Edwards, a pair of Halifax, ducing the Montreal and Ottawa pair to show their best tennis before bowing out of the picture. In the first set, Edwards and Little broke through McDiarmid's first service to take a 1-0 lead; the winners then broke through Edwards' first service to square the set. Watt won his first service to give McDiarmid a 2-1 lead but the Halifax duo again squared the match as Little won his first service. But here McDiarmid began showing some real championship form and with able help from his partner Watt ran off the next three games to win the set 6-2.

Ottawa Girl Shows Courage

In the ladies doubles the strong Ottawa and Montreal pair of Mrs. G. Lewis and Miss Jean McCraday won the title by default after winning the first set 6-love from Miss Doreen Graham of Ottawa and Miss Jean Wright of Nova Scotia, a severe arm injury suffered by Miss Graham in a match Friday causing her to collapse as the champions led 2-0 in the second set. But although the Ottawa and Montreal pair seemed much the stronger nevertheless Miss Graham although suffering much pain in every game of the match showed undoubted courage as she played through the number of fans present for the finals and although the competition was not as close as in former years nevertheless Helen McCraday and Jean Wright, the two men behind the scenes and indefatigable workers, responsible for the staging of the meet are to be heartily commended on the splendid manner in which they conducted the tournament and the great entry list that was on hand.

Mixed Doubles

The mixed doubles proved another straight set victory with Mrs. Lewis and Don McDiarmid proving too strong for the Nova Scotia pair of Miss Jean Wright and Hugh Little. Scores of the match were 6-2, 6-2 with the superior driving and net play of the Montreal and Ottawa team proving the main factor in the 16 game match. Little and Wright had won the title in the final in a semi-final morning match when they defeated the strong team of Miss Helen McCraday of Ottawa and Peter McKenzie of Saskatchewan after a hard three set battle. The Ottawa and Montreal team booked the title for the first time after defeating the first game of the opening set to their opponents copped the next six games in a row to win 6-1.

Bobby Riggs Wins Eastern Grass Tennis

RYE, N. Y., Aug. 11.—(AP)—Bobby Riggs today displayed the tennis that carried him to the United States championship, defeating Don McNeill of Oklahoma City in four sets to win the eastern grass court tournament for the fourth successive year. McNeill's strokes streamed off his racket as he won the next six successive games, holding McNeill to one earned point in that span, and limiting his own errors to a minimum. When he finally trucked the set away at 7-5, the usually decorous tennis crowd went mad. The women's doubles finals went to Alice Marble and Sarah Palfrey who defeated Mary Hardwick and Valerie Scott of Great Britain, 6-4, 6-3. Alice Marble won the women's singles title Saturday by defeating Helen Jacobs, 6-1, 6-0.

"Fighting Irish" Leo Kelly primed and ready for the fray meets fast, clever Cecil Braithwaite tonight at the Sporting Club in a 10-round battle that has caught the fancy of the local fight fans. For Kelly, already with two victories under his belt on his comeback effort to be tackling a fighter who has piled up an enviable record. Braithwaite no stranger to local fans has fought over one hundred fights and in those scraps has at times been Canadian amateur middleweight champion and also provincial amateur champion of Montreal and Quebec. He has now been fighting professionally for three years and in that time has fought the best in Canada and the United States. Included in his list of opponents has been Jack Dubois, Al Shanks, Frankie Nelson, Billy Lancaster, Willie Haran, Bill Sparks, Ray McIntyre, Danny McCormack and Tom Peck. So it will be seen that Kelly will be stacked against a fighter who has proven his worth in actual ring warfare and one who is dangerous and smart every minute of a fight. For all that doesn't ease the Island's "Fighting Irishman" in the least. He has already fought a draw with the same clever boxer and feels confident that he has improved sufficiently enough in boxing and hitting ability to turn the tables this time on the popular colored lad who has never failed to please in all his appearances. Local fans are all set up over the scrap and with Kelly more popular than ever due to his recent fine showing they are willing to "lay it on the line" that the local fighter will tonight hurdle another obstacle in his attempt to gain recognition as one of the Dominion's leading light-heavyweights. The second main event of the card, a scrap between Higgins of Denmark, Nova Scotia, and Jim Mooney of Peakes promises to be a clay-bang, drag-em-out affair from the gong with both fighters slugging it out from the opening gong. Mooney as he has shown can stand up under the heaviest going and is always in there fighting while Higgins is reputed also to be a boy who likes to go in there and slug it out until he or his opponent fades from the picture. This bout should be a real slug-fest all the way. To complete the card two other evenly matched bouts have been lined up and things should start about 8:30 p.m. at the Sporting Club tonight and continue that way until a winner has been decided.

The even break put the Indians on the same level as the Detroit Tigers who started the day with a full game advantage before a pair of 4-3 decisions to Chicago. The Chicago games were attended by 22,329 persons. In New York the Yankees went their three-game series with Philadelphia Athletics when Joe Gordon hit his 21st homer of the season in the 11th inning for a 7-6 victory. Hudson himself singled over the Senator's first run in the second inning. Three games were played Saturday. The Yankees checked up a 5-2 victory over the White Sox in a game that was called at the end of the fifth because of rain; Yankees averaged the Athletics 13-9; and Washington shut out Boston Red Sox 3-0.

Greyhound, Peter Astra To Clash

GOSHEN, N. Y., Aug. 11.—(AP)—Goshen beckons this week to those who love to lean on a white-washed fence and thrill to the sight of trotters coming through the stretch. The pick of the continent's trotters and pacers open Monday the five-day \$125,000 Grand Circuit meeting, high-spotted by a clash between Greyhound, fastest trotter in history, and Peter Astra, last year's champion three-year-old and the \$45,000 Hambletonian, the Kentucky derby of harness racing. Greyhound, back in competition after two years of exhibitions, has won five straight races but has not come close to his world record of 1:55 1-4. Peter Astra also has been winning but hasn't yet been forced to touch his mark of 2:02 1-4. They will meet Monday for the first time. Forty-seven three-year olds remain eligible for Wednesday's Hambletonian, richest in eight years but not more than 10 are expected to face the starter, Spencer Scott, owned by C. W. Phellis of Green-wich, Conn., is expected to contest the choice at 3 to 1 in the most wide-open race in recent years.
