

PRUSSIAN LIST ALONE HAS NAMES OF 1,740,863 MEN.

WHAT AUSTRALIA IS DOING IN THE WAR.

OTTAWA, Aug. 30.—A report received from Australia by the trade and commerce department from Canadian Trade Commissioner D. H. Ross, of Melbourne, gives some interesting information as to what the sister dominion is doing for the empire in the war.

The war expenditure of the commonwealth is now estimated at the rate of \$225,000,000 a year. The war deficit of the commonwealth fiscal year, which ended with June last, was met by a loan from the British government.

To provide for the steadily growing expenditure for war purposes, the government has decided, after consultation with leading bankers and financiers, to float a commonwealth loan in Australia to the extent of \$100,000,000, the entire proceeds to be devoted to war purposes. The loan will bear interest at four and a half per cent. at par and is to be made available to small investors by minimum bonds \$100 and \$100 for inscribed stock.

The war census bill, now before the commonwealth parliament with the general approval of both political parties, is a far reaching measure intended to fully disclose to the government the resources of men and money available within the commonwealth to prosecute the war. The bill proposes to do two things:

1. To require every male citizen of fighting age to give an exact account of his physical condition, his social and industrial status and his military capacity; and
2. To compel every person of either sex, aged eighteen and upwards, who owns property, or is in receipt of income, to disclose, in confidence, the precise nature, extent and value of his or her possessions.

The object of the bill is to furnish the government with complete and accurate knowledge of the force which it aspires to organize for the promotion of national security.
