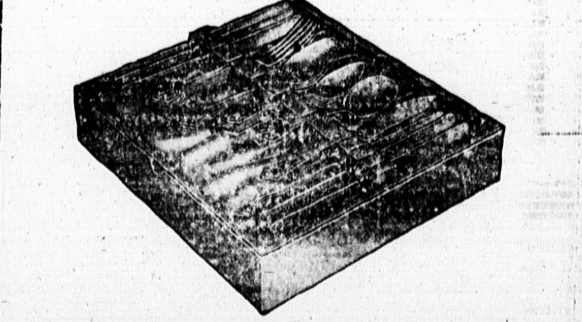
"Well what?" asked Ronny bluntly. And nobody had any answer ready. "We ought to be able to think of something," said Bill. "Who's got any brains?"
