SEASONAL NOTES

The spring which so far as temperatures and growth during April and early May promised to be about average, has due to wet and cold weather being delayed so that the planting season for 1934 is late.

Temperatures below freezing occurred on the nights of May 8, 9, and 20th at the Experimental Station. The lowest temperature in the swamp area at St. Avarids was 22 degrees on May 17 and 21st.

This formed ice and would injure early vegetables. It also injured clover. There has been surprising growth, however, in the grass and clover pretty generally throughout the province. The lawns at the Experimental Farm were cut on May 10th. The orchard was sprayed on the 12th.

Oats were sown at the Station on the 18th and wheat on the 22nd, and it was not until the 25th that mangels were seeded. This is much later than average. There is a very great amount of water in the soil and with this reserve late seeding should mean very good crops in our province. The seeding of vegetables and flowers has been greatly delayed owing to frequent showers, but growth will no doubt be very rapid from now on when we get heat with the moisture.

Our bees which came through the winter in splendid shape had many frames covered with brood pollen, honey, and bees. The supply of pollen, however, has been so scarce that the queens had practically stopped laying, and many bees evidently became chilled in their flight and did not return to the hives. This set back will no doubt reduce the honey crop for this year, as it will require warm weather and a good food supply before the colonies will be built up again to their April strength. Some tried feeding but the colonies all had plenty stores of honey and the trouble was due to the bees being unable to secure enough pollen to feed their brood.

The report of the Egg Laying Contest every week has shown that the high production is being maintained. This is also true in connection with the 1933 pullets on the plant for the last month, these 350 birds have laid from 70 to 75 per cent of the possible. The 1100 chicks in the brooder houses have made splendid gains and the older ones which have been full feathered, some will be segregated right away. Hurdles have been used to give them large runs and it is most surprising how they have eaten off the grass so that near the houses the ground is quite bare.

The pig testing station has been fitted up for twelve pens of pigs with storage and a mixing floor for feed. The six pens that have already been received have made splendid gains, averaging over a pound a day with some pigs making as much gain as 20 pounds in fourteen days. Just as soon as they reach 80 pounds in weight the ration will be changed and less protein will be supplied.

toric events of the landing of Jacques Cartier in what is now Canada, and the Commemoration of the IV Centenary of Jacques Cartier, which is being staged in several of the places first visited by this great explorer.

In these days, with the great proportion of travel by automobile, it is essential that low costs of vehicular transportation by water, when necessary, should be recognized. In this connection it may be pointed out that Prince Edward Island is the only Province in Canada that is separated from her sister provinces by water; that we have a ferry system operated by the Federal Government across the Straits of Northumberland—a distance of nine miles—and an almost prohibitive charge for the transportation of automobiles is being exacted, which is a great deterrent for prospective visitors who wish to see the beautiful and historical "Garden of the Gulf." This ferry should be considered as a connecting link, as if a bridge or tunnel were the medium, in which case there would be levied only a reasonable toll, and not a charge of \$4.00 or \$5.00 for an automobile only.

In many ferries throughout Canada with a great deal more mileage, autos are carried at nominal rates. For instance in the Thousand Islands, from Kingston, Ontario, to Clayton, New York, the charge is \$2.50, and if returning the full fare both ways. Here, we have a case of autos being carried from one country to another (Canada to the United States) a distance of twice what it is from Cape Tormentine, New Brunswick, to Borden, Prince Edward Island (one Canadian Province to another) and the charge in the latter route is twice as much.

Mr. Enderby, General Manager of the Canada Steamship Company, when speaking before our Committee, and when questioned by a writer as to what he would consider a fair charge for the carrying of an automobile on a trip of nine miles, said, "Twenty-five cents." He explained that the auto charge should be a minimum one so as to induce more passenger traffic on which the money was really made, and any substantial charge acted only as a great deterrent, while with a low charge the revenue would be really greater and he had no hesitation in stating that it would be sound and better business. Mr. Enderby also remarked that an autoist could do a lot of travelling on a land with \$4.00 or \$5.00.

I make a strong and special appeal that the Members of this Committee support the efforts of the Premier of Prince Edward Island, the President of the Prince Edward Island Tourist Association, Boards of Trade, and Members of the Government, so that we shall have a happy consummation of our reasonable and rightful request.

In conclusion may I say that it

is not only essential but imperative that these charges must be materially reduced, if Prince Edward Island, with such a unique and attractive setting in the Gulf of St. Lawrence—the smallest Province but with the best summer climate, colorful and compelling scenery in the Dominion—is to have a fair chance for inducing a greater proportion of tourists to visit our Fair Province.

South Africa Wants Canadian Lumber

There are great possibilities for Canadian lumber and box shooks in the South African market, according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. Practically every industry using box shooks is rapidly expanding, according to reports received, with many of the importers and co-operatives requesting Canadian supplies. South Africa can be divided industrially into two main branches agricultural and pastoral and the other mining. The manufacturing industry, comparatively speaking, is small. Mining, particularly gold, is one of the great industries in South Africa and the high premium on gold at the present day has greatly increased its value. The diamond industry, however, has been pretty hard hit, falling from a total of approximately 52,500,000 in 1929 to \$7,500,000 in 1932 there was a slight increase in value in 1933 although production fell, due to

improved prices, and for that year the sales approximated \$10,000,000. With the improvement in the world's economic condition, a revival of the diamond industry is anticipated.

ANTS ENTER FIELD AS WEATHER PHROPTERS A new prognostication in the art of season forecasting turned up in Springhill, Nova Scotia, recently. Partridges with feathered pants, squirrels and their store of nuts, onions with thicker skins, breast bones of barn yard fowl, all have made their debut and now along

comes black ants. There is a party in Springhill, William Reece, who has been keeping tabs on the comings and goings of black ants for a number of years and he states that this year they have appeared the earliest he has ever noticed, according to the Tourist Department of the Canadian National Railways. The black ants put in their appearance in the early part of May while other years it was not until the early part of June that they appeared on the scene. Indications from this are that the Martimes will have a very early summer.
