Girl is Brought From Death to Life

(By Dominion News Service)

LONDON, Oct. 16 — A remarkable story of how a child apparently died during an operation and was restored to life for sometime was told to Mr. Ingleby Oldie, Westminster Coroner, at an inquest on Violet Winifred Leonard, the nine year old daughter of a sheet metal worker in Bermondsey.

The girl was operated upon at St. George's Hospital in an attempt to join a sound nerve to a palsied one. During this she was thought to have died, her breathing and heart beats being stopped. Massage and other remedies were applied and the heart began to beat again and continued to do so for an hour and a quarter, when she again began to breathe. At this time she had been taken back to the ward, but respiration ceased in a quarter of an hour.

Dr. Braxton Hicks, pathologist at Westminster Hospital, said death was due to syncope occurring during an operation to a patient who was suffering from the status lymphaticus. The operation was a necessary one, and was being properly performed and the anaesthetic was suitable. It was a remarkable case in many ways.

The coroner, in recording a verdict of "Death by misadventure," said that the operation was a very difficult and dangerous one, the patient's heart stopped, and she was in fact, dead, but a miracle was performed. The abdomen was opened and the heart was massaged by the hand, and the dead patient came to life again. Had it not been for the condition of status lymphaticus he thought the chances were that she might have recovered completely.

No Limit to Risks Taken by Golfers

MANCHESTER, Oct. 16. — A thunderbolt fell on the golf course at Heaton Park, Manchester, near five women who were playing on the course.

Some of them, as well as a caddy, were knocked off their feet by the force of the impact. All of them received a severe shock, but escaped serious injury.

Mrs. H. Stott, Manchester, one of the players, told a reporter that one of the party was over 60 years of age.

"We were approaching the 17th green when the flash came," she said. "The lightning struck a wooden guide post, split it in two, and then threw up about a quarter of a ton of soil.
