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RELIGIOUS SERVICES

Art and life was the subject of an interesting address by Mr. James Harris at the Sunday evening song service last night. Art is the handmaiden of religion, the speaker told the young people, and without it man would probably not have developed as he did down through the ages since the cave man. Painting, music and architecture were some of the branches of art mentioned by the speaker. "The only talents that will live after us," Mr. Harris reminded the young people in conclusion, "are those given to our fellowmen."

ST. JAMES CHURCH The extremely mild weather allowed many of the older people to attend the service. There was a large congregation at St. James Church at the morning service. There was a full choir, and the singing was hearty and voluminous. The soloist was Mrs. H. S. Henderson. An inspired and inspiring message was delivered from the pulpit by the Minister, Rev. Dr. E. Woodard Legate who chose three texts—1st Corinthians 4:3-22—"All things are yours"; Genesis 42:26—"All these are against me"; Romans 8:28—"All things work together for good to them that love God." He applied these respectively to youth, when the world is apparently ours to conquer and to make what we like of; to middle age when we are up against the buffetings of life, and realize that apparently the things that are against us are more than those that are for us; and then in the eventide of life, when looking backward, and profiting by experience, we realize that through the sacrifice of Jesus Christ the work of God, everything is made to fit in and work together for our own good in the love and providence of God.

THE BAPTIST CHURCH The Rev. F. E. Bishop who has arranged to assume the interim ministry of this congregation until the coming of the Rev. H. L. Denton, spoke to large congregations yesterday morning and evening. The morning sermon had as its theme "The wounds of service" based on Isaiah 53-5. "But he was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities; that chastisement of our peace was upon him; and with his stripes we are healed."
