ada, small fortunes were made by the early breeders, \$3,750 being not an unusual price for a pair of foxes during the first years of the industry. Fox farms are now located in every county in Norway, it being estimated there are about 10,000 in operation. Last year Norway exported 138,707 silver fox skins valued at about \$5,257,000, according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. Britain is the big market, although Germany and France also take large quantities. In addition to silver foxes, 375 farms are devoted to the production of red foxes, 422 to cross-foxes, 416 to blue foxes and a number of farms to marten, mink, pole-cat and other fur-bearing animals. Last year these farms produced 3,311 red fox pelts, 6,666 blue fox pelts, a few white fox and cross-fox pelts also were exported.
