**King "Prime Minister Of Long Promises"**

BRAMPTON, Ont., Oct. 27—Al- luding to Premier Mackenzie King as a "Prime Minister of long promises," Right Hon. Arthur Meighen declared this afternoon, speaking here in the interest of M. S. M. Charters who is being opposed by W. R. P. Parker the Liberal candidate, that never was there a campaign where the current seemed so unimpeded and the harbour of victory so near for his party as in this.

The Liberal government, said Mr. Meighen, had partly implemented their pledges to the Progressives during three years, because they were compelled to, with the result that the reductions they made on agricultural implements resulted in increasing the price to the consumer.

"No good came to anyone, much less the farmer, through such reductions," said the Conservative leader.

**20 DEAD 30 INJURED IN TRAIN WRECK**

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 27—Twenty dead and over thirty injured were the known toll taken when the Sunny Land fast St. Louis and San Francisco passenger train left the rails today near Victoria, Miss. and tumbled in a tangled mass down a forty foot embankment. At least twenty persons were killed outright or died before the relief train could reach the scene and possibly twice that number were injured.

**Conflicting Reports To Increase Export Of Cattle To Britain**

BAHRA, Iraq, Oct. 27—Conflicting reports are being brought in concerning a cyclone which swept Bahroon Islands in the Persian Gulf.

The first account of that storm brought in by the Indian merchant ship Lawrence stated 7,000 lives were lost and two hundred pearl fishing vessels were missing. A later report says one thousand lives were lost and 70 boats destroyed.

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 27.—The month of November promises to mark a new phase in the export of cattle to the United Kingdom. As a result of negotiations carried on by western live stock men with the K. Jensen shipping line of England a service of boats designed especially for the transportation of Canadian cattle to the old country is to be inaugurated. These boats are to be fitted up with four decks and will have a carrying capacity of about 1,000 head of cattle.
