World Being Divided

"Whether we like it or not," he added, "the world is being divided into different political and economic interests. New groupings of minor nations are arising, one on the one hand of the Big Three have taken shape."

Shortage Of Trained Construction Workers

OTTAWA, Feb. 20 (CP)—A national conference of employees of the construction industry agreed today that insufficient workers were available to carry out the program of building costs and called for apprenticeship training to swell the ranks of skilled workers by 5,000 a year for four years.

Reconversion Speeding Up In Great Britain

LONDON, Feb. 20 (CP)—A six-month increase of almost 2,000,000 in the number of workers employed in home civilian industries and services and manufacture for export was announced today by the Labor Ministry as United Kingdom shopkeepers and export statistics gave obvious proof that the war-time boom in production was gaining momentum.

HALIFAX, Feb. 20 (CP)—Military authorities announced tonight that two overseas wives will be aboard the liner Boylston, expected to dock here next Tuesday, Feb. 26.

S. D. U. Debating Team Wins From Saint Thomas

A Saint Dunstan's University debating team was last night successful in upholding the proposition of the resolution, "Resolved that the atomic bomb is a lethal weapon which should be abolished from military warfare," against a team from St. Thomas University, Charlottetown.

Soviets Disatisfied

Observers said the Russian use of the words "incompatible with normal relations" indicated Soviet dissatisfaction with the situation. There also was speculation the Russian declaration might have been prompted by some Canadian Government communication, perhaps a protest to the Russian Government.

Reds Annoyed With Canadian Government

LONDON, Feb. 20 (CP)—Russia acknowledged tonight that Canadian citizens had given "sensitive" data to Soviet representatives in Canada, but declared that the position taken by the Canadian Government was "not compatible with friendly relations between the two countries."

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8 PASSENGERS ESCAPE IN FIRE

ICING FORCES BRITISH LIBERATOR TO MAKE NIGHT LANDING IN SNOW STORM.

One person was killed and three injured seriously here last night when a British Overseas Corporation four-motored Liberator with 15 aboard crashed and burned at the Charlottetown Airport. All eight passengers escaped serious injuries.
