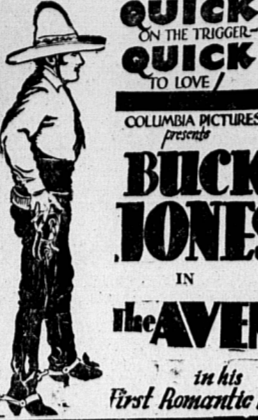

FRANCIS E. SULLIVAN

With feelings of deep sympathy and profound regret we chronicle the sad and sudden death of Francis E. Sullivan, Kinkora.

During his early life the deceased was a man of strong physique and robust health, but while serving his country in the late war he developed a disease of the heart which little by little overcame his former strength, so that for some years past he was unable to do any heavy manual labor. Nevertheless he continued to supervise and help with his farm work and it was while thus engaged in the fulfillment of his daily duties that the gentle and sudden call of his Master came.

He was born in June 26th, 1888 and was the youngest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Owen Sullivan, Vernon. With the exception of a few years spent in Western Canada he remained at home until he enlisted in March, 1915. During his first years of war service he was on garrison duty in Halifax. In June 1917 he transferred to the 12th Construction Corps for overseas service and about one year later was invalided back to Canada.

In 1920 he married Mary Callaghan, eldest daughter of Peter and the late Mrs. Callaghan, Emyvale and settled on the homestead in Vernon. Some years later with a view to obtaining greater facilities for the education of his children

He leaves to mourn their loss a sorrowing wife and seven small children also the following brothers and sisters: John T. Medford, Mass., Aloysius and Joseph A., Vernon, Mrs. James Finlay, Vernon, Mrs. Jas. Monaghan, Hazelbrook, Mrs. Arthur Lord, Danvers, Mass., and Miss Catherine, Watertown, Mass.

Requiem High Mass was sung by Rev. Louis P. Callaghan, his brother-in-law. The absolution was given and the service at the grave performed by his pastor, Rev. Dr. M. J. Smith. Present in the Sanctuary was Rev. John Sullivan, cousin of the deceased. After the Mass the funeral slowly wended its way to the Catholic cemetery, his little children marching immediately behind the remains of their father. Here in the presence of wife, children, brothers, sisters and friends all that was mortal of a devoted husband and father was lowered to its final resting place. To these we extend our deepest sympathy.

The pallbearers were: Joseph and Aloysius Sullivan, Vernon, Amos and Mathias Callaghan, Emyvale, Michael and Eugene McIvor, Kinkora. May his soul rest in peace.

NEW NAVAL COMMANDER.—Lieutenant Governor Dalton has received a communication from the Department of National Defense stating that the Lord Commissioners of the Admiralty have appointed Rear Admiral the Hon. R. A. R. Plunkett - Emile - Erle - Drax, O.B., D.S.O., to succeed Vice Admiral Sir Vernon H. S. Haggard, K. C.
