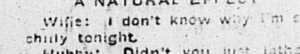

Zombro Dillon, Trotter Is Sold For \$10,000. HANOVER, Pa., Sept. 30.—An announcement today by Starting Judge Fred Shreeve from the stand during the race meeting held in connection with the Hanover Fair that will be of much interest to the horse world was the purchase by the Hanover Shoe Stable of Zombro Dillon, by Dillon Axworthy, from George W. Roxbury, of Philadelphia. The consideration was \$10,000.

This six-year-old gelding, which stepped an exhibition mile here yesterday in 2:08 1/2, is one of the most promising trotters living, developed by Herman Tyson, Newark, Del. trainer. He made a record of 2:04 3/4 as a four-year-old at Lexington. Last year he took a track record of 2:10 at the Reading Fair. His first appearance under the new ownership will be at the Interstate Fair at Trenton, N. J., next Monday.

Sarcasm And Irony

"Well before 1979 Mellon and Callaux will be no more in this world and long before the whole business will be forgotten."

"At Washington," says this paper, "they are talking about our annuities. It is more comical. All that is not worth this, the passage of the French delegation across the Atlantic. It is not worth the dinner Mr. Coolidge gave. The agreement they are getting ready to make will be worth just about as much as the piece of paper on which it is written, which sets forth in francs and centimes what Germany would have to pay until the end of the century or until judgment day."

"We don't think it worth while getting angry about this ridiculous and childish business. A reasonable indemnity can be collected from a nation in several years. Bismarck in 1871 showed how to do it. But just name one people who through history has paid tribute to another for two-thirds of a century. It was never done. There is the example of the Boxer indemnity, and the United States were the first to renounce it."

"If the French commission brings back any proposition for Paris to pay Washington for sixty-two years this document ought to be put along with some German bonds which the commission on reparations has in its pigeon holes or among its old papers. None any longer takes seriously payment from Germany except deliveries of coal which Pennsylvania does not say that France alone must pay until 1957. You are kidding."

"L'Oeuvre" today says Callaux calls Friday and asks: "Is not there any boat leaving sooner?" In a most ironic article Gastave Terry, editor of L'Oeuvre says: "Don't be too quick to brand as savages these people of the New World, still so primitive. 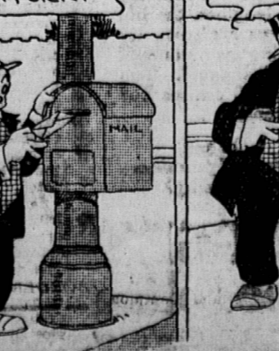

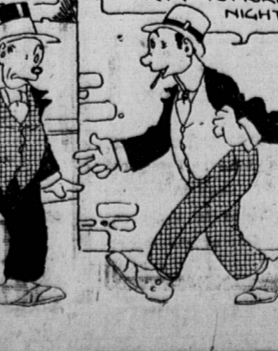

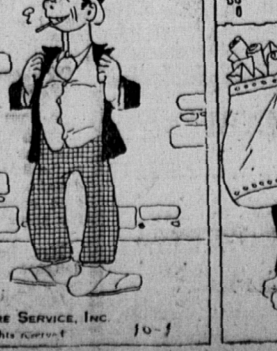
