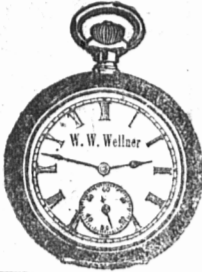

SOME WELL KNOWN PEOPLE IN KOREA

Near to the Scene of the Present War.

Rev. Mr. Robb and Miss Robb Brother and Sister of Secretary A.W. Robb of Charlottetown.

Now that Korea is likely to become the centre of operations in the war that is just beginning, it is not without interest to notice that Rev. A. F. Robb and Miss Robb, brother and sister respectively of Andrew W. Robb, the secretary of the Charlottetown Y. M. C. A., are residents in Song Chiu, Korea, on behalf of the Presbyterian church of the Maritime Provinces, and likely to witness some stirring scenes in the near future.

The Rev. Mr. Robb and his wife, formerly Miss Bessie Cumming, of Westville, N. S., have been in the country about two years, and Miss Robb left St. John as recently as last October to join them.

Korea, it might be mentioned, is about the size of New York and Pennsylvania and has a population of 10,000,000. Not many years ago it was an unknown country to the majority of people. It has suffered much at one time and another from China and Japan, and seems likely to be the battlefield in the present war. The people are Mongolian in origin and are a handsome looking race. The capital of the country is Seoul, a city surrounded by a great wall after the manner of the Chinese. It is rich in palaces and possesses eight gates. In describing a tour throughout the country, Mr. Robb says they travel about 25 miles a day, the Korean pack ponies not doing more than three and a half miles an hour. It is necessary to carry all provisions, as the staple food is rice, which to the western palate is somewhat monotonous. On reaching Kyong Song, the capital of Northern Ham Kyong, Mr. Robb and his party were privileged to see the arrival of a new governor of the province. He was accompanied by a long train of officials who had gone out to meet him, some in chairs borne by four men, and some on horseback. He was preceded by runners. Some blew trumpets and others shouted "Get out of the way! Go into your houses and shut the doors!" The custom in times past has been to show respect in this way. On the journey in question Mr. Robb went across into Manchuria towards Possiet Bay, and returned by steamer via Vladivostok.

The river Tu men crossed in a dug-out canoe and Chinese territory was reached for the first time. The country is described by Mr. Robb as having a rich soil, the houses are surrounded by a high wall of baked mud. They encountered a caravan of 26 heavy four-wheeled Russian carts, drawn by two or four horses, with Chinese drivers and an escort of Russian soldiers. They were proceeding up country with grain for a Russian garrison. Many ruins were seen of towns destroyed by the Russians during the Boxer movement. The Manchurian lion is a curious place as described by Mr. Robb. The guest room is a large barn-like place about 18 feet by 40 feet. There is an open fireplace for heating water in the middle of the room. Smoke from the kitchen pervades the whole place and everything is blackened by smoke and dust. Mr. Robb refers to a large Russian garrison at Hun Chuan, and adds that it is evident the Bear has no intention of lifting his paw from Manchuria. Vladivostok is mentioned as a large and rapidly growing city. Most of the houses are of brick and cement, and are of recent construction. Mr. Robb and his party were objects of suspicion to the Russians, being taken for spies. The dispute between Russia and Japan has brought forth an order that no civilians should visit the military stations without a governor's order. In his recent letters Mr. Robb has not made many references to the then impending war.
