**THE MARKETS**

**(Canadian Press)**  
**MONTREAL, Sept. 2.**—The market today was quieter owing to the falling off in the demand for exports and only sales of a few loads of oats and barley were made at C.I.F. prices. Montreal's car lot movement for domestic account was small, but the tone of the market for oats was steady. There was no further development in the market for old crop spring wheat, flour, prices being in moderate demand. The export business in new crop spring wheat flour was quiet. Owing to the continued small offerings for new crop winter wheat flour from Ontario millers and the light stocks available a very firm feeling prevailed in the market and prices were fully maintained. A fair business continues to be done in most of the millfeed for the season of the year, and as supplies were none too large to meet the daily requirements the tone of the market was firm. Some business was transacted in standard grades of rolled oats and prices were firm.

While the egg trade was extremely dull prices were fully maintained.

Extreme dullness marked the trade in butter, but the tendency was steady. The under tone of the cheese market was firm but the trade volume was small.

**OTTAWA, Sept. 2.**—A strong tone continues on the Canadian egg market with a half cent price advance reported from Montreal. All other Toronto jobbing prices show no advance there is a stronger undertone on the market. A car of fresh vegetables was reported and is now being shipped to Montreal for export to Great Britain. Toronto steady and unchanged, jobbing specials 42.3-50.39, firsts 36, seconds 33. Country shippers are paying extras 35, firsts 32, seconds 25. Reports are to the effect that dealers will commence using storage stocks next week.

Montreal, the tone of egg market is improving with prices rising.

**Prince Cheered On Every Side**

**CONCORDIA, Argentina, Sept. 2.**—Forty six thousand cattle assembled in one place for his benefit was one of the sights seen by the Prince of Wales on his tour this week of Argentina and his visits to some of the great estates.

Crowds greeted the Prince everywhere, and at any hour of the night cheers are heard as his train passes through the small stations. Several thousand people waited until 1.45 this morning at Concordia to cheer as his train went by without stopping. His Royal Highness has been greeted by bands of singers in their national costumes, by cowboys riding unbroken horses and he enjoyed thoroughly the unusual experience of this trip. On the way to Mercedes he laid a wreath on a war memorial, a simple altar of stone surmounted by a tall wooden cross.

**Life-Size Monument To First City Teacher**

**MONTREAL, Sept. 1.**—On the site of the first school founded in this city, 1657, a life-sized bas-relief of the founder is being sculptured. Hon. P. C. Carlin, president of the company erecting the memorial, wished to keep green the memory of this notable woman, the venerable Marguerite Bourgeois. This year it is estimated that 14,000 tourists visited the warehouse on St. Lawrence Boulevard where the first school stood. The designer of the bas-relief is Philip J. Turner. The founder is depicted in the dress of the order which she founded. On her right she is standing a French child holding a book as though in study, and on the left a young girl, the daughter of the founder, who is an Indian child. The arms of Marguerite Bourgeois rest upon the shoulders of the pupil and above her in the background are represented two cherubs.
