Miss Mary A. Connors and Miss Minnie Trail, Boston, who have been spending six weeks with friends and relatives in this city and at Tracadie, have left on return.

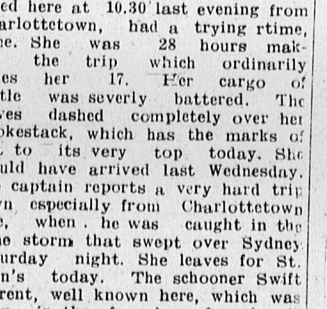

A storm, great in force, and damaging in its results, passed over Sydney Saturday. An exchange says: In the shape it was encountered by Sydney, the storm was undoubtedly the worst since the "August" gale. Five schooners and one tug went ashore in the harbor. There is a yacht thrown up, or dashed on a wharf, or sunk, for every hundred vessels in the east shore. The Rosal yards of the Charlottetown, had a trying time. She was 28 hours making the trip which ordinarily takes her 17. Her cargo of cattle was severely battered. The waves dashed completely over her smokestack, which has the marks of salt to its very top today. She should have arrived last Wednesday. The captain reports a very hard trip down, especially from Charlottetown here, when he was caught in the same storm that swept over Sydney Saturday night. She leaves for St. John's today. The schooner Swift Current, well known here, which was lying in the fog above Ingraham's wharf, was torn from her moorings by Hugh McDonald's Tug, the Alert, which was swept away from the old Sydney and Louisburg pier. These two vessels, and the schooner Col. Otter, which was anchored in the stream, were driven ashore at the Shipyard within a hundred yards of each other. The Swift Current is loaded with gravel and lumber, and the Col. Otter is piled high with pit props.
