-It pays to buy in this Province -Rev. Jas. Strothard, of Summerside, has contributed an article to the Wesleyan on Methodism in and about Summerside.

-Mrs J. W. Trowsdale, proprietor of the Commercial Hotel, Conway, is at present spending a few days with friends and relatives of French River and Granville.

-Mrs Austin Ramsay, Conway spent Christmas at Ellerslie the guest of her parents P. and Mrs Miller, she was accompanied by her son Master Roland.

-A large and representative meeting of the lobster packers and fishermen was held at Sea View on Tuesday evening Dec 27th to discuss the new lobster regulations. The voice of the meeting was strongly opposed to the new regulation being enforced and recommended instead the following:—1 that traps be no more than one inch between laths. 2 that heads be not more than two inch extension mesh. 3 do away with the parlor trap. 4 stop fishing the 30th June. 5 strict enforcement of returning all banded lobsters to the water. 6 that the government establish hatcheries on the north side of the Island. 7 more strict enforcement of the close season. Meeting closed by appointing Charles Sudbery as delegate to attend the meeting to be held in Charlottetown.

-The only change in the Summerside market prices yesterday was that of butter which sold at eighteen to nineteen cents a lb.

-A telegram was received by H.A. Leslie, Kensington, yesterday announcing the death in Boston of John Noonan. The remains are expected to arrive in Kensington on Tuesday next when the funeral may take place on arrival of train on the following day.

-The following are the Alberton Market prices: White oats per bushel, thirty-five cents; black oats per bushel, thirty-five cents; butter per lb, eighteen to twenty cents; eggs per dozen twenty-four cents; pork per lb, six and three quarters to seven and a half cents and hides per lb, seven cts.

-Acting upon information of Inspector Gough, Officers Phillips and Steele made a raid yesterday morning on the premises of Clement Arsenault in search of liquor, but found only a little over one bottle. Arsenault, when he saw the officers coming, locked the door of the room and also the drawer in which the liquor was found, and while the officers were making the search attempted to interfere by drawing a revolver. He was handcuffed and taken to jail and will be given a hearing in the police court this morning.

-The Guardian rebuts to announce the loss of a valuable cow owned by a leading barrister of Summerside, which took place on Sunday morning last. The cow had only been purchased about a week before from a gentleman who was about to leave the town and had only been removed to its new quarters a couple of days before. On Sunday when the owner's son, who by the way is an 'amateur vetebrary' went out to the stable he discovered the cow apparently dead, he at once started to administer restoratives but without avail, and upon examination no apparent cause for death was found and the conclusion is that the cow died of grief over its change of quarters.

-B. W. Tanton, sec'y of Prince County Hospital committee, received yesterday through Dr. A. McNeill, a cheque for \$25, from Chief Justice Sullivan. This contribution unsolicited and unexpected fittingly expresses his Lordship's sympathy with and interest in the benevolent institutions in the Province. The committee has also received the sum of \$31.84, being the amount of the collection Christmas Day at St. John's Baptist church, Miscouche. These are the first installments of Xmas collections received by the Hospital committee. FOSSIL RATES ARE TOO HEAVY

PITTSBURG, Pa., December 28.—The question of freight rates was one of the engrossing topics discussed by the American Geological Society at its annual meeting here yesterday, when Dr. W. J. Holland, director of the Carnegie museum, presented a resolution asking the appointment of a committee to take up with the railroads the matter of a change in the classification of fossils. Dr. Holland declared that he had paid \$2,000 freight charges on a shipment of fossil rock for which \$200 would appear ample in comparison with other freight schedules.

INTERNATIONAL RAILROAD COMMISSION PROPOSED WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—As a result of a long series of conferences between Judge Martin Knapp, Chairman of the Interstate Commerce Commission, and the Hon. J. P. Mabey, chief of the Railway Commission of Canada, an agreement has been reached to recommend to the Governments of the United States and the Dominion of Canada the creation of an international railroad commission, which shall have supervision over the railroad rates in operation between the two countries.
