One pair, treasured by the old lady until she was about eighty years old, was contributed by her ten years ago to a fund which was being raised for the preservation of the old South Church, Boston. The yarn of the stocking was unravelled out and small pieces were attached to cards bearing her autograph. From the sale of these cards the sum of \$100 was realized.

The pet of Mrs. Tyler's childhood was the little newborn lamb, found almost dead, which she had carefully nursed back to life, sitting up all one night to care for it. Daily she combed its fleece, and tied the wool with bright ribbons. It became devotedly attached to her, and followed her about everywhere. One day her brother "Nat" suggested that they take the lamb to school. It followed willingly enough, and Mary secreted it beneath her seat, a high, boarded-up, old-fashioned seat, in the very quietest, covered up with her shawl. By-and-by Mary had to leave her seat to recite. A moment later there was a clatter and a patter on the floor and the lamb came following after.

The teacher, a Miss Polly Kimball, who was afterward the mother of Mr. Loring of Boston, did not reprimand Mary, but laughed heartily with all her pupils. Mary, very much mortified, led the lamb out of doors, and put it in a shed, where it remained until she went home at noon.

There happened to be visiting the school that morning a young man—John Roulstone, the son of Mary's dancing master. He was greatly pleased at the incident, and the next day came again to the schoolhouse, bringing Mary a slip of paper containing three stanzas which he had composed. Two stanzas were afterward added by a Mrs. Townsend.

When she had grown to young womanhood Mary taught school at Fitzburg. After her marriage she held the position of matron of the McLean Insane Asylum at Somerset, Mass., for thirty-five years.—Washington Times.

## THE EDITOR'S MAIL.

### PROVINCIAL PROHIBITION.

SIR:—In the past we have looked up to you in The Guardian as one of the leading champions of Prohibition and the enemy of the licensed traffic in intoxicants and we fully appreciate the sacrifice you made in the good cause. The Prohibitory Law now in operation in Charlottetown was supported not only by the Government that brought it in, but also by the majority of the Opposition members and the success of that law in Charlottetown in restricting and controlling the accused traffic in intoxicants has clearly shown the wisdom of passing the law, the evidence of which has been made manifest in the columns of your paper from time to time. And I believe that if the Prohibitory Law was extended to the whole Island instead of the Scott Act, we would have more direct control of the traffic and would be in a position to do better work in restricting it.

And we think it advisable that The Guardian should point out to them some of the changes that should be made in the Prohibitory Law. From observation of the effects of intoxicants on man it is quite evident the drinker as well as the seller should be more severely dealt with. The appalling sin of upsetting our reason, one of the highest emanations that came out from the Creator, is of such a dangerous and ruinous character that it should be punished with pains and penalties of a much severer nature. Political partizanship is the enemy of Prohibition. Prohibitionists should rise above party; Christ before sect; principle before party.

More wisdom and backbone is wanting in place of the jelly-fish nature of many temperance people. Law enforcement cannot be successfully carried on without a strong public sentiment behind it and to be successful we must continue to educate, agitate and organize. There can be no doubt, but Prohibitionists can exercise more control over the few legislators that assemble in Charlottetown than we can over the 24 that meet for legislating at Ottawa. And I may here say by way of reminder that it was made abundantly evident and clear to us by the famous Manitoba Liquor Act and upheld by the much more famous decision of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council of Great Britain that the Provincial Legislature had sufficient authority to stop the sale of liquor in the Provinces of Canada. But of course the House of Commons and Senate can go further and adopt more drastic laws or repression; they can stop the manufacture and importation of intoxicants into the Provinces of the Dominion. I think there is no doubt but the Island voters would favor the adoption of the Charlottetown Prohibitory law throughout the whole Island.

Prohibition is in sight in this Province. A bird in hand is worth two in the bush. Lean not upon political partizans as they are too deep in the struggle for place, power and pelf. Our Federal legislators at Ottawa failed to give us the benefit that we had good reason to expect from the majority vote cast at the federal plebiscite in favor of prohibition, and we now turn to our Island legislators for something better. We have watched the working of the Prohibitory Law in Charlottetown with the keenest interest and may fairly claim a victory for it. We look upon it as the outcome and fruit of the federal and provincial plebiscites. The Privy Council in all probability would never have been applied to for their judgment as to how far the jurisdiction of our provincial legislators extended in the enacting of Prohibitory laws had not the plebiscites been taken. The plebiscites were a potent means of arousing the public conscience to a truer sense of their responsibility for the continuation of the wicked traffic in intoxicants.
