## PROHIBITION INSPECTORS.

Experience in the enforcement of both the Scott Act and the Prohibitory Law has demonstrated the great value of capable, alert, and zealous inspectors, and the relatively little value of those who are content simply to draw pay and let the work take care of itself. The inspectors appointed under the Prohibitory Law for the several counties are as follows:

Queen's County—Robert Jenkins, Mt. Albion; Simon Brown, Hunter River; William J. McIntyre, Mill Cove.  
 Prince County—Bradford Gough, Summerside; Henry Leslie, Kensington.  
 Patrick Doyle, Tignash.

King's County—Henry Campbell, Miltova Cross; Nell J. Campbell, Elmira.

It is the duty of these officials to carefully watch for violations of the law, collect evidence, make searches for liquors kept for illegal sale and prosecute all offenders against the law. We know how zealous and capable Inspector Jenkins has been in enforcing the law in this city and in overlooking the work in Queen's County. The Heatherly, McKinnon, O'Brien and McMillan cases in Queen's County were laid by him. Some other inspectors are doing fairly good work, but not all. We would suggest that all the officers employed in the enforcement of the law be required to make monthly, or at least quarterly reports of their work to the Government, and that such reports be accessible to the press.

The Guardian has had many intimations from correspondents in various parts of the Province who are desirous to know what the inspectors are doing and why in some cases they seem to be inactive. If frequent reports were made as suggested, the public would know who are working and with what result, and who are inactive or inefficient. This the people desire to know and have right to know. We trust that the suggestion as to inspector's reports may meet with the early and favorable consideration of the Government.

Rev. Edwin Smith, who is himself a good sailor, has published a letter in defence of Capt. Brown of the Stanley. He was himself down on the coast early in the day on which the Stanley was at Georgetown on her mission of relief. Mr. Smith expresses his strong conviction that Capt. Brown did right in not attempting to round East Point on that day. He will not say that it was impossible for the Stanley to have got around the Point, but he says, "To attempt it would simply mean that the seas would sweep in all their fury from end to end over her decks, and not a man dare expose himself on deck, even for a minute." Rev. Mr. Smith knows what he is talking about and his character and standing lend weight to his words.

We trust that our Senators and Members of the Commons will lose no time and spare no efforts in impressing upon the Marine Department and the Government the importance of providing life boats and life-saving stations for the Island. The cost would not be very great, and the service is most imperatively necessary. Why should Nova Scotia have ten or more life-saving stations and this Province, wholly surrounded by the sea as it is, have none at all?

## FRESH FISH SHIPMENTS.

In view of the growing importance of our trade in fresh fish, particularly smelts and eels shipped during the winter season to the markets of Boston and New York, The Guardian has taken some considerable pains to obtain the information for shippers. A representative of this journal has three times visited the fish markets of those cities and conferred at length with those engaged in the trade whose ads appear in our columns. We have been careful to accept only advertisements from those whom we believe to be reliable and we trust that business between our shippers and these advertisers may prove to be entirely satisfactory. These ads will prove the most useful guide to our shippers from the fact that a number of the firms formerly engaged in the fish trade are not now in it.

It is of the first importance to both shippers and consignees that the shipments shall arrive in good order and at the best time of the week to be disposed of to advantage. Even with the greatest care and the best precautions there will necessarily be occasional loss in such perishable goods as fresh fish, especially when soft weather intervenes between the date of shipment and their arrival in Boston and New York, or immediately after their arrival as must sometimes occur. To avoid this risk as far as possible it is most important too that fish should be shipped so that they will reach their destination early in the week, as fish arriving the last of the week are liable to be kept over Sunday and in consequence be spoiled or greatly reduced in value.

Fresh fish sales is always early each day. The practice of shipping in barrels should be avoided. Much better results will be obtained by the regular boxes in which the fish are carefully placed side by side in two tiers, the heads at the outside and the tails overlapping and in the middle of the box; they should be laid straight and not cross piled and thus when exposed for sale present an attractive appearance.

Those shipped in barrels must necessarily be dumped out in large trays before being offered for sale. Careless or design.

log shippers should learn that it is useless to place a few layers of large fresh fish at the top and bottom of the box or barrel with smaller or partly decomposed fish between. Honesty is the best policy in the fish trade as in other lines of business. The fish should not be wrapped in paper or have mixed in with them seaweed or refuse of any kind as is sometimes done, for in the event of soft weather intervening they invariably present a dirty and distasteful appearance, or may be spoiled, which either reduces the value by several cents per pound or makes them entirely unsalable.

Another point worth observing is to assort the fish by sizes making two or three grades and having each box contain fish of uniform size throughout as nearly as possible. Put nothing in the boxes but fish and in mild weather a little ice. No water should be put in with fish, only ice. From two to three times as much can be realized from smelts shipped in boxes with ice only as in barrels with ice and water as it whitens the gills and reduces the value. Even in barrels with ice only they come through in a muddled up condition. The writer has noticed the marked difference when placed for sale in Fulton Market, New York. The nicer they are packed and more carefully they are assorted the higher price they will realize. For Americans do not mind the price if the article is in good shape.

By observing these rules, shipping at the right time of the week, and with the fish properly assorted and packed so as to arrive in clean and presentable condition the best results will be obtained. Those who will take the pains to cater to the taste of their customers in the fish trade as in all other trades will find their reward in increased prices. Shipments in boxes greatly facilitate the handling of the fish as well as preserving them in good order and the better financial results will more than repay the increased time and trouble.

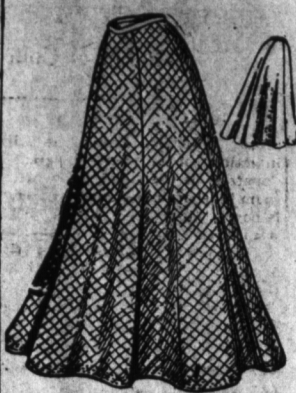
