IN MEMORIAM

REV. DONALD J. MacLEOD

There passed away at McLeod, Alberta on Tuesday, September 25, the Rev. Donald J. MacLeod, D.D., who was formerly Chief Superintendent of Education at Charlottetown, P.E.I. and came West a few years ago to reside with his son, John A. MacLeod, manager of the Pembina mine at Evansburg. He leaves to mourn their loss a widow, (nee Margaret McPherson), sister of Mrs. Harry Houle of Charlottetown, two sons, John A. MacLeod of Evansburg, D. B. MacLeod of Toronto and two daughters, Mrs. L. Roberts of Annapolis, N. S. and Mrs. Norman E. Pitcher of Edmonton. Mr. MacLeod was appointed Chief Superintendent of Education for Prince Edward Island in 1891 and resigned in 1900. Later he went to Sydney and then to Northfield, Mass., where he studied for the ministry in the Moody Institute. After his ordination he engaged in evangelist work and preaching for a number of years in U. S. Retiring from the ministry some years ago he went to West-born Canada. Mr. MacLeod was born at Hartsville, P. E. I. over 70 years ago. He received his early education in Hartsville, later at Prince of Wales College and other institutions of learning. Before being appointed Chief Superintendent of Education he taught in Prince of Wales College. He was an educationalist of considerable ability and popular with students and teachers. Besides his sons and daughters referred to in the obituary notice taken from the Edmonton Journal he leaves to mourn on the Island the children of three Brothers, viz. A. B. MacLeod and Mrs. Capt. Allen MacLeod of Hartsville, Daniel MacLeod, Malcolm MacLeod and Miss Annie MacLeod of Hopedale, Mrs. Malcolm Cummings, Mrs. Angus Campbell and Mrs. Finlay Matheson of Darlington, and Mrs. George Morrison of Braided Wood Islands.

The funeral service which was conducted by Rev. E. D. Cameron of Edmonton University was held on Thursday afternoon at two o'clock from Connelly and Armstrong parlors to Edmonton Cemetery. (Patriot Please Copy)

Middle-Aged Golfers Scorn Doctor's Warning

CLEVELAND, Oct. 25 — The warning of London physicians that persons 50 years old or more are endangering their lives by playing golf is scoffed at by Cleveland's "Indian Scouts" foursome, believed to be one of the oldest active quartets in the world, who may be seen regularly on the golf links here. Their combined age is 227 years. None of them started playing golf until he was past the hal century mark.

The foursome is composed of Charles W. Burrows, 74; G. T. McIntosh, 75; J. W. S. Webb, 69, and A. W. Neale, 59. All are prominent business men here and may be seen on the links every Saturday and a couple or three times a week," as one of them put it.

When they are "on their game" the foursome play in the low eighties or nineties. They have been playing together for about 12 years. "I don't know of any pastime more pleasant, more healthful and more invigorating for a man between the ages of 60 and 80," Mr. Burrows said. "Of course a man who allows his muscles to become soft and flabby from lack of exercise, smoking, overeating and drinking and then goes out on the course and overtaxes his strength is in danger, but moderate golf means health for a man past 50 who keeps himself in condition. "Walking around the course by yourself or even with three friends would be too monotonous. Playing golf, you exert yourself for an instant with a stroke drive and then you rest while the others tee off.

INCREASED INTEREST IS SHOWN IN STUDY OF MIGRATORY BIRDS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25—Rapidly growing interest in the study of migratory birds and their habits is indicated by the large increase in the banding of birds, the Department of Agriculture declares. Since July 1 this year and up to early October more than 12,000 birds have been banded by the biological survey or by its voluntary cooperators in birdbanding studies. For the year which ended June 30 last more than 25,000 birds were banded, an increase of 6,000 over the previous year. Reports have been received from 1,200 banders birds after their liberation which officials consider a very good percentage.

HOLD REVENUE MEN AS BOOTLEGGERS

DOYLESTOWN, Pa., Oct. 28.—Eight United States Internal Revenue agents detailed to reorganize the \$2,500,000 stock of liquor stored in the warehouses of the Philadelphia Pure Rye Whisky Distilling Company at Edgington, Bucks county, were arrested this afternoon by three of the Pennsylvania State constabulary.

The revenue officers are charged with the illegal transportation of intoxicating liquor for beverage purposes. The arrests were made by Corporal Nevin Sees of Troop C, Pottsville, assisted by Privates Bertram Marx and Earl Hans. Corporal Sees and Private Hans are members of Gov. Pinchot's "flying squadron" of State police detailed to carry out the liquor laws. Through a scheme originated by Corporal Sees, and old locker was obtained in the liquor warehouse inside of which Corporal Sees spent every day for two weeks, while he watched the revenue agents tap the whisky barrels and fill up pint flasks, place them in suitcases and traveling bags and lock them to their own lockers until time to leave for their homes in Philadelphia at night.
